SUBJECT: APPROVAL OF REQUEST TO THE CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE TO DEED A HIGHSMITH-RAINEY HOSPITAL PARKING LOT PARCEL TO COUNTY PURSUANT TO N.C.G.S. § 160A-274

BACKGROUND

Part of the parking for the Highsmith-Rainey Hospital is a parking lot that consists of six (6) parcels. One of those parcels was conveyed to the Cape Fear Valley Hospital System with the 2006 transfer agreement. Four (4) of the parking lot parcels are owned by the County. One of the parking lot parcels is owned by the City of Fayetteville. A GIS map of all these parcels is attached.

Upon final approval of the transfer of the Highsmith-Rainey Hospital to the Cape Fear Valley Health System, the Board of Commissioners directed that the county request the City of Fayetteville to deed the parcel owned by it within the Highsmith-Rainey Hospital parking lot to the county.

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

The county attorney recommends adoption of the following resolution to request the City of Fayetteville to deed the parking lot parcel to the county:

Whereas, one of the parking lots serving the Highsmith-Rainey Hospital consists of six (6) parcels; and

Whereas, one of these parcels, identified with PIN 0437-35-4190, is owned by the City of Fayetteville: and

Whereas, the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners desires to clear the title to the entire parking lot which is maintained by the Cape Fear Valley Hospital System in order to convey the parking lot with the hospital building to the Cape Fear Valley Hospital System.

Be it therefore resolved that the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners requests the City of Fayetteville to deed the parcel with PIN 0437-35-4190 to the County of Cumberland, without consideration, pursuant to N.C.G.S § 160A-274.

This fund is utilized to pay for medical expenses when an animal owner cannot be located, and medical attention is needed.

Vehicle Insurance Fund 803

2) Vehicle Insurance - Budget Ordinance Amendment B180041 totaling \$136,301 to recognize revenue in the amount of \$124,844 and appropriate Vehicle Insurance fund balance in the amount of \$11,457

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment B180041 in the total amount of \$136,301. This amendment recognizes revenue of \$124,844 as amounts to be received from County departments. SUBJECT: LAND PURCHASE FOR THE SOLID WASTE MELVIN CONTAINER SITE

BACKGROUND

The Solid Waste Department operates the Melvin Container Site located at 3811 Dudley Road, Fayetteville, NC 28312. This is a leased site and the Solid Waste Department attempted to purchase two acres from a tract of land containing 19.7 acres in 2014. The property is owned by the Fisher, Lula Mae Melvin Heirs. The Department and the property owners had agreed to a purchase price of \$30,000 for the two acres of land. The subdivision of land was conditionally approved by the Planning Department on May 19, 2014. However, due to some tax liens identified by the County Attorney, the County was unable to move forward with the purchase of the property.

The property owners notified the Solid Waste Department that the tax lien against the property has been paid in full. The County Attorney has verified that there is no longer a lien against the property and that the Department can move forward with seeking approval from the Board of Commissioners to purchase the two acres. The Planning Department issued an extension to the conditional approval of the subdivision on August 2, 2017. The purchase of the property will secure a permanent location for a container site within this area of the county for citizens to properly dispose of their waste. The estimated construction cost of establishing a new container site is approximately \$75,000. Therefore, there is significant value in being able to purchase this property that is already being utilized as a container site. Once the County obtains ownership of the property, the Solid Waste Department will be able to enhance the site by installing asphalt on the access road in and out of the facility. There is available funding within the FY 18 operating budget for the purchase of this property.

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

The Facilities Committee approved the recommendation listed below at its March 1, 2018, meeting and forwarded this item to the full Board of Commissioners as a Consent Agenda item at the March 19, 2018, Board of Commissioners' Meeting:

Enclosed you will find a Certified Bid Tabulation Form for the Roof and Exterior Wall Sealant Replacement at Crown Coliseum. I recommend that Cumberland County enter into a construction contract with Triangle Roofing Services, Inc. to include the base bid and alternate numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, and 6 for a total contract sum of \$1,735,100.00.

Alternate number three requires the contractor to use the membrane manufacturer FiberTite. Our office recommends this alternate be accepted for several reasons. FiberTite's stronger reinforcing provides better performance in a mechanically fastened application because the reinforcing has a direct role in keeping the membrane attached to the roof in a wind event. In addition, FiberTite manufacturers their membrane using the propriety polymer made by Dupont called KEE. In our experience, membranes with KEE are more durable and have a longer service life. Furthermore, FiberTite is the only manufacturer specified that manufacturers a blue membrane that matches the original membrane color of the dome. Also, we have observed that FiberTite's field technical representation is equal to or better than the other manufacturers specified.

The estimated construction time is 60 days. The target timeframe to begin construction will be in late June or early July.

4. CONSIDERATION OF PROPOSAL FOR ROOF AND EXTERIOR WALL SEALANT REPLACEMENT AT CROWN COLISEUM

BACKGROUND:

The Crown Coliseum roof and exterior wall sealant were identified for replacement and included in the capital improvement installment financing plan that was approved by the Local Government Commission (LGC) on September 12, 2017.

A pre-bid meeting was held on January 29, 2018, in which all local contractors were invited to attend. Informal bids were received on February 22, 2018 for the proposed roof and exterior wall replacement. The lowest, responsible and responsive bid was submitted by Triangle Roofing Services, Inc. in the amount of \$1,735,100. A \$40,000 Owner's Allowance is included in the base bid amount.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

The Engineering and Infrastructure Director and County Management recommend that the Facilities Committee approve the following recommendation and forward it to the Board of Commissioners for its consideration at their March 19, 2018 meeting.

1. Approve the contract for Triangle Roofing Services, Inc. for the Roof and Exterior Wall Sealant for the Crown Coliseum in the amount of \$1,735,100.

Mr. Brown reviewed the background information and recommendation as recorded above. Commissioner Council asked if there were any local bidders. Mr. Brown stated all contractors that submitted a bid were outside of the Cumberland County area, but all bidders do work within this area. Mr. Brown stated the funding is part of the installment financing package.

5. UPDATE ON ANIMAL SERVICES HVAC PROJECT

BACKGROUND:

The HVAC system at Animal Services has proposed significant challenges for the Facilities Management Division of the Engineering & Infrastructure Department over the last six months. Replacement parts for the existing equipment are extremely difficult to obtain. Staff have been waiting for nearly eight weeks and still do not have a simple fan shaft which is the reason why an additional exhaust fan had to be installed in the adoption kennel. The units have reached the end of their useful life as the facility operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The location of the units also provides challenges as they are located inside the facility above the ceiling in a very consolidated space. There is not adequate access for staff and there is not sufficient space for staff to maneuver around the equipment for repairs. Maintaining a constant temperature within the facility is crucial for not only the health and well-beings of the animals, but for staff as well.

Due to these reasons above, the Engineering & Infrastructure Department has worked with Progressive Design Collaborative on designing a replacement system for the facility. The construction drawings are complete, and a pre-bid meeting has been set for February 28, 2018 at 10:00 AM. The engineer's estimate for replacement of this system is \$327,000. Fund balance appropriated for maintenance and renovations will be used to fund the project. Our goal is to have this project completed by early June 2018.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Facilities Committee is not being asked to take action at this time. The purpose of this item was to provide the Committee an update on the status of the HVAC system at Animal Control. Once bids are received on the project, the consideration of the contract will be brought back to the Committee for action.

SUBJECT: COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT - DISASTER RECOVERY (CDBG-DR) AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE

BACKGROUND

The Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) is a program intended to address the impact of Hurricane Matthew on those that have a need for affordable housing. This grant is a pass-through from the Federal government to the State of North Carolina and then onward to counties that suffered the worst damage from the hurricane. Cumberland County and the City of Fayetteville have collaborated to develop a plan to address post-hurricane housing needs. This plan has been reviewed and approved by the State, and a Memorandum of Agreement between the County and the State has been executed so that funding can now be accessed by the County. In order to continue forward and allow the City of Fayetteville to request funding for its projects from the County, an agreement between the County and the City is required. The attached agreement was revised after discussion at the February 1, 2018 Finance Committee Meeting and forwarded to the City for further consideration. The City Council approved the revised agreement at its February 26, 2018 regular meeting. The attached agreement adheres to HUD requirements and has been reviewed and approved by the State, the City Council, and the County Attorney's Office. Proposed projects will be brought back to the Board of Commissioners for approval prior to being let.

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

At its February 1, 2018 meeting, the Finance Committee approved the CDBG-DR agreement between the County and the City with changes and requested the County Manager be authorized to execute the agreement. The Finance Committee is forwarding the agreement as a Consent Agenda item to the full Board for its consideration at its March 19, 2018 regular meeting.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN COUNTY OF CUMBERLAND AND CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT-DISASTER RECOVERY PROGRAM

THIS AGREEMENT, entered into this ____ day of _____, by and between the COUNTY OF CUMBERLAND (hereinafter called the COUNTY), a body politic and corporate of the State of North Carolina, and CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE (hereinafter called the CITY), a body politic and corporate of the State of North Carolina with its principal address at 433 Hay Street, Fayetteville, North Carolina 28301.

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Assembly passed the Disaster Recovery Act of 2016 (S.L. 2016-124) requiring the NC Department of Commerce to transfer to the North Carolina Department of Public Safety - Division of Emergency of Management all Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) program funds; and

WHEREAS, the COUNTY has applied for and received the Community Development Block Grant Recovery Disaster Program (CDBG-DR) funding under the Continuing Appropriations Act of 2017 and Emergency Assistance Act and Public Law 114-254 from the United States Government; and; Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended (42 U.S.C. 5301 et seq); and

WHEREAS, the COUNTY desires to partner with the CITY to serve the citizens within the City of Fayetteville through the CDBG-DR program in utilizing such funds; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree that:

I. SCOPE OF SERVICES

A. <u>ACTIVITIES/PRINCIPAL TASKS</u>

The CITY shall provide services under the 2017 CDBG-DR Program Year in a manner satisfactory to the COUNTY and consistent with any standards required as a condition of providing these funds.

- 1. <u>Program Activities</u>. CITY shall conduct the following activities eligible under the Community Development Block Grant Program for the project site located within the city limits of Fayetteville.
- Activity #1. <u>Housing Recovery:</u> The CITY will undertake housing activities to include single family homeownership rehabilitation, single family homeownership reconstruction; mobile home repair; housing repair reimbursement; small rental repair; and provide affordable single family ownership in Fayetteville.
- Activity #2. <u>Multi-Family Rental Housing:</u> The CITY and the COUNTY will jointly choose a consultant to guide the parties in selecting an experienced individual that demonstrates the capacity and ability to carry out the activities in accordance with HUD's guidelines and contractual obligations.
- Activity #3. <u>Economic Development (Small Business Recovery)</u>: The CITY and the COUNTY will undertake this activity in accordance with the coordination and administration of the Department of Commerce. All interested small businesses must be referred to the agency selected by the Department of Commerce and

funding will be administered by the Department of Commerce.

- Activity #4. <u>Community Recovery:</u> The CITY and the COUNTY will collaborate as a part of the homelessness initiative in the development of a facility to provide supportive services and shelter to homeless individuals and families.
- 2. <u>General Administration</u>: The following general administration activities are necessary to provide the activities described in Activities/Principal Tasks.
 - Activity #1 Assigned staff of the Cumberland County Community Development Department will conduct the required monitoring of activities as described in the Cumberland County Community Development Monitoring Handbook for Community Development Block Grant funds conveyed to CITY.
 - Activity #2 The CITY shall be responsible for the preparation and submission of all documents and reports relative to final close-out of the grant.
 - Activity #3 The CITY shall keep and maintain books, records and other documents relating directly to the receipt and disbursement of grant funds, and the fulfillment of this agreement and job creation.
 - Activity #4 The CITY shall at all reasonable times agree to provide the staff of Cumberland County, the NC Department of Public Safety, Department of Commerce, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Office of the Inspector General access to and the right to inspect, copy, audit and examine all of the books, records and other documents relating to the grant and the fulfillment of this agreement for a period of four years following the completion of all closeout procedures respecting the Community Development-DR funds, and the final settlement and conclusion of a for documentation required of the program by the Grantor.

B. <u>NATIONAL OBJECTIVES</u>

The CITY certifies that the activities carried out with funds provided under this Agreement shall meet the CDBG-DR Program National Objective of providing benefit to low/moderate income persons. All activities funded with CDBG-DR must meet one of the CDBG-DR program's national objectives: benefit low and moderate income persons; aid in the prevention or elimination of slum or blight; or meet community development needs having a particular urgency as defined in 24 CFR 570.208 and 4 NCAC 19L.1004.

II. TIME OF PERFORMANCE

The term of this Agreement shall begin on the 1st day of <u>March, 2018</u>, and end on <u>February 28,</u> 2020.

III. FUNDING SOURCE - CDBG-DR

The COUNTY will allocate **<u>\$15,325,000</u>** in CDBG-DR funds for the purpose of benefiting low/moderate income persons in the City of Fayetteville.

IV. METHOD OF COMPENSATION/PAYMENT SCHEDULE

The parties agree that the total amount to be allocated by the COUNTY under this contract shall not exceed **<u>\$15,325,000</u>**. Reimbursements for the payment of eligible expenses will be charged to the program and will not exceed the allocated amount. If discrepancies are discovered during monitoring, the COUNTY

reserves the right to restrict the CITY to payment for eligible expenses on a reimbursement basis only. The parties agree that any costs incurred prior to February 1, 2018, of the Program Year in which the contract is executed will not be eligible for reimbursement. Payments will be contingent upon certification of the CITY'S financial management system in accordance with the standards specified in 2 CFR Part 200.

VII. **GENERAL CONDITIONS**

GENERAL COMPLIANCE Α.

The CITY agrees to comply with the requirements of the Housing and Urban Development regulations concerning the Community Development Block Disaster Recovery Program (CDBG-DR). The CITY also agrees to comply with all other applicable Federal, State and local laws, regulations, and policies governing the funds provided under this contract. The CITY further agrees to use funds available under this Agreement to supplement rather than to supplant funds otherwise available.

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR Β.

Nothing contained in this Agreement is intended or shall be construed to create or establish the relationship of employer/employee between the parties. The CITY shall at all times remain an "Independent Contractor" with respect to the services to be performed under this Agreement. The COUNTY shall be exempt from payment of all Unemployment Compensation, FICA, retirement, life and/or medical insurance and Workers' Compensation Insurance as the CITY is an independent contractor.

C. HOLD HARMLESS REIMBURSEMENTS

The City shall comply with all the requirements set out in in the Grant Agreement CDBG-DR PROJECT NUMBER: 17-R-3006 between the N. C. Department of Commerce and the North Carolina Department of Public Safety/Division of Emergency Management (the State) as Grantor, and Cumberland County, Grant Recipient (the Subsubrecipient) in administering any contracts or programs funded through the County under this Agreement. Specifically, The City, in its use of any of these funds, shall be responsible to the County, in its capacity as Subsubrecipient of these funds from the State, for reimbursement of any grant funds which are determined to have been improperly expended and for which the County is required to return to the State.

D. WORKERS' COMPENSATION

The CITY shall provide Workers' Compensation Insurance coverage for all of its employees involved in the performance of this contract.

INSURANCE AND BONDING Ε.

The CITY agrees to comply with 24 CFR Part 85 Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State, Local and Federally Recognized Indian Tribal Governments.

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F. <u>DEBARRED / SUPENDED</u>

The CITY must not make any award or permit any award (subgrant or contract) at any tier to any party that is debarred or suspended or is otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in federal assistance programs subject to 2 CFR part 2424. The requirement set forth in 24 CFR Part 5 apply to this program.

G. COUNTY RECOGNITION

The CITY shall ensure recognition of the role of the COUNTY agency in providing services through this contract. All activities, facilities and items use pursuant to this contract shall be prominently labeled to indicate Cumberland County CDBG-DR as a funding source. In addition, the Borrower shall include a reference to the support provided herein in all publications made possible with funds made available under this contract.

H. <u>AMENDMENTS</u>

The COUNTY or CITY may amend this Agreement at any time provided that such amendments make specific reference to this Agreement, and are executed in writing, signed by a duly authorized representative of both organizations. Such amendments will not invalidate this Agreement, nor relieve or release the COUNTY or CITY from its obligations under this Agreement.

The COUNTY may, at its discretion, amend this Agreement to conform with Federal, State or local governmental guidelines, policies and available funding amounts, or for other reasons. If such amendments result in a change in the funding, the Scope of Services, or schedule of activities to be undertaken as part of this Agreement, such modifications will be incorporated only by written amendment signed by both COUNTY and CITY.

I. SUSPENSION OR TERMINATION

Either party may terminate this contract at any time by giving written notice to the other party of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof at least 30 days before the effective date of such termination. Partial terminations of the Scope of Service in Paragraph 1.A above may only be undertaken with the prior approval of the COUNTY. In the event of any termination for convenience, all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, maps, models, photographs, reports or other materials prepared by the CITY under this Agreement shall, at the option of the COUNTY, become the property of the COUNTY, and the CITY shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work completed on such documents or materials prior to the termination.

The COUNTY may also suspend or terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, if the CITY materially fails to comply with any term of this Agreement, or with any of the rules, regulations or provisions referred to herein; and the COUNTY may declare the CITY ineligible for <u>any</u> further participation in the COUNTY'S contracts, as stated in the Monitoring Policy of Cumberland County Community Development, in addition to other remedies as provided by law. If there is probable cause to believe the CITY is in noncompliance with any applicable rules or regulations, the COUNTY may withhold all or any portion of said contract funds until such time as the CITY is found to be in compliance by the COUNTY, or is otherwise adjudicated to be in compliance.

VIII. ADMINISTRATIVE REQUIREMENTS

Α.

FINANCIAL AND PROGRAM MANAGEMENT

1. Administrative Requirements

The CITY agrees to comply with 24 CFR Part 85 "Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State, Local and Federally Recognized Indian Tribal Governments", as applicable, regarding financial and program management. The CITY further agrees to adhere to the accounting principles and procedures required therein, use adequate internal controls, and maintain necessary source documentation as necessary.

2. Cost Principles

The CITY will administer its program in conformance with 2 CFR Part 225, "Cost Principles for State, Local and Indian Tribal Governments". These principles will be applied for all costs incurred whether charged on a direct or indirect basis.

B. DOCUMENTATION AND RECORD-KEEPING

1. <u>Records to be Maintained</u>

The CITY shall maintain all records required by the Federal regulations specified in <u>24 CFR</u> <u>507.506; 2 CFR 200</u> that are pertinent to the activities to be funded under this Agreement, such records shall include, but not be limited to:

- a. Records providing a full description of each activity undertaken;
- Records demonstrating that each activity undertaken meets one of the National Objectives of the <u>CDBG Program</u>;
- c. Records required to determine the eligibility of activities;
- d. Records documenting compliance with the Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity components of the <u>CDBG Program</u>;
- Financial records as required by <u>24 CFR Part 570.502</u>, <u>2 CFR 200</u> and <u>24 CFR Part 85</u>; and
- f. Other records necessary to document compliance with Subpart K of 24 CFR 570.

2. Retention

The CITY will retain all records pertinent to expenditures incurred under this contract for a period of four (4) years after the termination of all activities funded under this Agreement. Records for non-expendable property acquired with funds under this contract will be retained for four (4) years after final disposition of such property. Records for any displaced person must be kept for four (4) years after he/she has received final payment. Notwithstanding the above, if there is litigation, claim(s), audit(s), negotiation(s) or other actions that involve any of the records cited and that have started before the expiration of the four (4) years, then such records must be retained until completion of the actions and resolution of all issues.

3. Employee Data

The CITY shall maintain data delineating those employees identified as being in the low/moderate income category. Such data shall include, but not be limited to, employee name, address, income level, or other basis for determining eligibility, and description or service provided. Such information shall be made available to COUNTY'S monitors or its designees for review upon request.

4. Disclosure

Employee and/or client information collected under this contract is private and the use or disclosure of such information, when not directly connected with the administration of the COUNTY'S or CITY'S responsibilities with respect to services provided under this contract, is prohibited by Federal law under 42 U.S.C., Section 145(b) (HUD/CPD) unless written consent is obtained from such persons receiving service and, in the case of a minor, from a responsible parent/guardian.

5. Close-Outs

The CITY'S obligation to the COUNTY shall not end until all close-out requirements are completed. Activities during this close-out period shall include, but are not limited to: making final payments and determining the custodianship of records.

6. Audits and Inspections

The CITY agrees to have an annual agency audit conducted in accordance with OMB Circular A-133. If the CITY does not meet the threshold requirements for an annual audit in accordance with OMB Circular A-133 standards, the CITY will have an annual audit conducted by an independent certified public accountant in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards (GAGAS). All CITY records with respect to any matters covered by this Agreement will be made available to the COUNTY, grantor agency, its designees or the Federal Government, at any time during normal business hours, as often as the COUNTY or grantor agency deems necessary, to audit, examine and make excerpts or transcripts of all relevant data. The COUNTY will send written notice of any deficiencies to the CITY within fifteen (15) days following audit/monitoring. Any deficiencies noted in monitoring reports must be fully cleared by the CITY within thirty (30) days after receipt by the CITY. Failure of the CITY to comply with the above monitoring requirements will constitute a violation of this contract and may result in the withholding of future payments.

C. **REPORTING AND PAYMENT PROCEDURES**

Indirect Costs

If indirect costs are charged, the CITY shall develop an indirect cost allocation plan for determining the appropriate CITY'S share of administrative costs and shall submit such plan to the COUNTY for approval, in a form specified by the COUNTY.

2. **Payment Procedures**

The COUNTY shall pay to the CITY funds available under this contract based upon information submitted by the CITY and consistent with any approved budget and COUNTY policy concerning payments. Payments shall be made for eligible expenses actually incurred by the CITY, and not to exceed actual cash requirements. In addition, the COUNTY reserves the right to allocate funds available under this contract for costs incurred by the COUNTY on behalf of the CITY.

3. Progress Reports

The CITY will submit regular monthly Progress Reports to the COUNTY in the form, content, and frequency as required by the COUNTY. If the CITY is more than 30 days delinquent in submitting its progress reports, the COUNTY will discontinue processing all requests for payment until such time as the delinquent reports are received.

D PROCUREMENT

1. OMB Standards

The CITY will procure all materials, property, or services in accordance with the requirements of 2 CFR 200, Procurement Standards, and will subsequently follow Property Management Standards as modified by 24 CFR 570.502(b), covering utilization and disposal of property.

2. **Compliance**

The CITY will comply with COUNTY'S policies concerning the procurement of services and the purchase of equipment and will maintain inventory records of all non-expendable personal property as defined by such policy as may be procured with funds provided herein. All program assets (unexpended program income, property, equipment, etc.) will revert to the COUNTY upon termination of this contract.

IX. PERSONNEL AND PARTICIPANT CONDITIONS

CIVIL RIGHTS Δ

1. <u>Compliance</u> The CITY agrees to comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as amended, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 as amended, Section 104(b) and Section 109 of Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, The Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Executive Order 11063, and with Executive Order 11246 as amended by Executive orders 11375 and 12086.

Nondiscrimination

The CITY will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability or other handicap, age, marital/familial status, or status with regard to public assistance. The CITY will take affirmative action to insure that all employment practices are free from such discrimination. Such employment practices include but are not limited to the following: hiring, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff, termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection from training, including apprenticeship. The CITY agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the contracting agency setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

3. Section 504

The CITY agrees to comply with any Federal regulations issued pursuant to compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 706), which prohibits discrimination against the disabled in any Federally assisted program. The COUNTY will provide the CITY with any guidelines necessary for compliance with that portion of the regulations in force during the term of this contract.

4. EEO Statement

The CITY will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the CITY; state that it is an Equal Opportunity employer.

5. <u>Subcontract Provisions</u>

The CITY will include the provisions of Paragraph IX.A. Civil Rights in every subcontract or purchase order, specifically or by reference, so that such provisions will be binding upon each of its own subrecipients or subcontractors.

B. <u>EMPLOYMENT RESTRICTIONS</u>

. Prohibited Activity

The CITY is prohibited from using funds provided herein or personnel employed in the administration of the program for: political activities, sectarian or religious activities, lobbying, political patronage, and nepotism activities.

2. Labor Standards

The CITY agrees to comply with the requirements of the provisions of Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. 276a-276a-5; 40 U.S.C. 327 and 40 U.S.C. 276c) and all other applicable Federal, State and local laws and regulations pertaining to labor standards insofar as those acts apply to the performance of this contract. The CITY shall maintain documentation which demonstrates compliance with hour and wage requirements of this part. Such documentation shall be made available to the Grantor for review upon request.

C. CONDUCT

No Assignment or Transfer

The CITY shall not assign or transfer any interest in this contract without the prior written consent of the COUNTY thereto; provided, that claims for money due or to become due to the CITY from the COUNTY under this contract may be assigned to a bank, trust company, or other financial institution without such approval, but notice of any such assignment or transfer shall be furnished promptly to the COUNTY.

2. <u>Subcontracts</u>

a. Approvals

The CITY shall not enter into any subcontracts with any agency or individual in the performance of this contract without the written consent of the COUNTY prior to the execution of such agreement.

b. Monitoring

The CITY shall monitor all contracted services on a regular basis to assure contract compliance. Results of monitoring efforts shall be summarized in written reports and supported with documented evidence of follow-up actions taken to correct areas of noncompliance.

c. Content

The CITY shall cause all of the provisions of this contract in its entirety to be included in and made a part of any subcontract executed in the performance of this Agreement.

d. Selection Process

The CITY shall undertake to insure that all contracts in the performance of this Agreement shall be awarded on a fair and open competition basis. Executed copies of all subcontracts shall be forwarded to the COUNTY along with documentation concerning the selection process.

3. Hatch Act

The CITY agrees that no funds provided, nor personnel employed under this contract, shall be in any way or to any extent engaged in the conduct of political activities in violation of Chapter 15 of Title V United States Code.

4. Conflict of Interest

The CITY agrees to abide by the provisions of 24 CFR 570.611 with respect to conflicts of interest, and covenants that it presently has no financial interest and shall not acquire any financial interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of services required under this Agreement. The CITY further covenants that in the performance of this Agreement no person having such a financial interest shall be employed or retained by the CITY hereunder. These conflict of interest provisions apply to any person who is an employee, agent, consultant, officer, or elected official or appointed official of the COUNTY, or of any designated public agencies or borrowers which are receiving funds under the <u>CDBG-DR</u> Program.

5. <u>Lobbying</u>

The CITY hereby certifies that:

- a. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or shall be paid, by or on behalf of it, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreements:
- b. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or shall be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, it shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions; and
- c. It shall require that the language of paragraph (d) of this certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts, under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all Subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

6. Lobbying Certification

This certification is a material representative of fact upon which reliance was placed with this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by Section 1352, Title 31, U.S.C. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

7. Copyright

If this contract results in any copyrightable material or inventions, the Grantor and/or grantor agency reserves the right to royalty-free, non-exclusive and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish or otherwise use and to authorize others to use, the work or materials for governmental purposes.

8. Religious Organization

The CITY agrees that funds provided under this contract shall not be used for religious activities, to promote religious interest, or for the benefit of a religious organization in accordance with the Federal regulations specified in 24 CFR 570.200(j).

X. ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS

A. <u>AIR AND WATER</u>

The CITY agrees to comply with the following requirements insofar as they apply to the performance of this contract:

- Clean Air Act, 42 U.S.C. 7401, et seq.
- Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251, et seq., as amended, § 1318 relating to inspection, monitoring, entry, reports, and information, as well as other requirements specified in said Section 114 and Section 308, and all regulations and guidelines issued hereunder.
- Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulations pursuant to 40 CFR Part 50, as amended.

B. FLOOD DISASTER PROTECTION

In accordance with the requirements of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (42 USC 4001), the CITY shall assure that for activities located in an area identified by FEMA as having special flood hazards, flood insurance under the National Flood Insurance Program is obtained and maintained.

XI. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby and all other parts of this Agreement shall nevertheless be in full force and effect.

XII. NON-APPROPRIATION CLAUSE

If appropriations of money to conduct and administer the presently scheduled program are lawfully reduced or terminated, or it is deemed in the public interest and necessity for the health, safety, or welfare of the public to so reduce or terminate this scheduled program, the COUNTY, at its option, has the right to terminate this Agreement effective upon the end of the fiscal year. The County shall give the CITY written notice of termination under the provisions of this paragraph immediately upon receipt of actual notice by the COUNTY of a reduction or termination of appropriations of money for the scheduled program, or any other necessity to reduce or terminate the program. Following the effective date of such termination the COUNTY shall have no further obligation to make any payments; the COUNTY shall have no right to recover any payments heretofore paid which were due and payable prior to the effective date of such termination.

XIII. Environmental Review Clearance

Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement, the parties hereto agree and acknowledge that this Agreement does not constitute a commitment of funds or site approval, and that such commitment of funds or approval may occur only upon satisfactory completion of environmental review and receipt by Cumberland County of a release of funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development under 24 CFR Part 58. The parties further agree that the provision of any funds to the project is conditioned on the County's determination to proceed with, modify or cancel the project based on the results of a subsequent environmental review.

XIV. UNDERLYING GRANT CONDITIONS AND REGULATIONS

The parties acknowledge that the source of funds for this Agreement is U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD" Grantor) and granted the funds to the Department of Commence ("DOC" Grantee). DOC has entered into an agreement with the NC Department of Emergency Management ("NCEM" Sub-Grantee) to administer the CDBG-DR funds. NCEM has entered into an agreement with the COUNTY to implement the approved CDBG-DR Action Plan approved on August 7, 2017. The COUNTY remains fully obligated to NCEM notwithstanding the designation of the SUBGRANTEE as the third party beneficiary for the undertaking of all or part of a program for which assistance is being originally provided to GRANTEE and in turn is being appropriated to the SUBGRANTEE under this Agreement. The SUBGRANTEE shall comply with all lawful requirements which may be imposed upon the GRANTEE and which may be deemed necessary to insure that such assistance is carried out in accordance with the GRANTEE's assurances and certifications to HUD regarding the use of such funds. Such assurances included, but are not limited to, representations that the use of such funds will fully comply with all applicable environmental laws, rules and regulations; that the funds will be used in a nondiscriminatory manner, etc. This Agreement shall be subject to all amendments, changes or other

modifications appropriate from time to time to insure compliance with HUD guidelines, rules, and procedures. See Exhibit 1, Supplemental General Conditions. For purposes of this Section the "Grantee" is the County and the "Subgrantee" is the City.

XV.

IRAN DIVESTMENT ACT CERTIFICATION Contractor hereby certifies that Contractor, and all subcontractors, are not on the Iran Final Divestment List ("List") created by the North Carolina State Treasurer pursuant to N.C.G.S. 147-86.55-69. Contractor shall not utilize any subcontractor that is identified on the List.

XVI. E-VERIFY

COMMUNITY DEVLOPMENT BLOCK GRANT SUPPLEMENTAL GENERAL CONDITIONS

- 01 <u>CONFLICT OF INTEREST</u>: Interest of Members, Officers, or Employees of the Recipient, Members of Local Government Body, or Other Public Officials. No member, officer, or employee of the recipient, or its agents, no member of the government body o the locality in which the program is situated, and no other public official of such locality or localities who exercises any functions or responsibilities with respect to the program during his tenure or for one year thereafter, shall have any financial interest, are direct or indirect, in any contract or subcontract, or the proceeds thereof, for work to be performed in connection with the program assisted under this agreement. Immediate family members of said members, officers, employees, and officials are similarly barred from having any financial interest in the program. The recipient shall incorporate, or cause to be incorporated, in all such contracts or subcontracts, a provision prohibiting such interest pursuant to the purpose of this section.
- 02 <u>LEGAL REMEDIES PROVISION</u>: As stated in Attachment O Circular No. A-1-2, 13.a: Contracts other than small purchases shall contain provisions or conditions which allow for administrative, contractual, or legal remedies in instances where borrowers violate or breach contract terms, and provide for such sanctions and penalties as may be appropriate.

Examples of legal remedies could be liquidated damages, consequential damages, arbitration and others not listed.

- 3) The subrecipient will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice, to be provided by the agency contracting officer, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the borrower's commitments under Section 202 of The provisions of Executive Order 11246 of Sept. 24, 1965, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- 4) The subrecipient will comply with all provision of Executive Order No. 11246 of September 24, 1965 and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

The parties to this contract certify and agree that they are under no contractual or other disability which would prevent them from complying with the requirements.
- c. The subrecipient will send to each labor organization or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, if any, a notice advising the said labor organization or workers representative of his commitments under this Section 3 clause and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment and training.
- d. The contract will include this Section 3 clause in every subcontract for work in connection with the project and will, at the direction of the applicant for or recipient of federal financial assistance, take appropriate action pursuant to the subcontract upon a finding that the subcontractor is in violation of regulations issued by the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, 24 CFR Part 135. The borrower will not subcontract with any subcontract where it has notice or knowledge that the latter has been found in violation of regulations under 24 CFR Part 135 and will not let any subcontract unless the subcontract has first provided it with a preliminary statement of ability to comply with the requirements of these regulations.
- e. Compliance with the provisions of Section 3, the regulations set forth in 24 CFR Part 135, and all applicable rules and orders of the Department issued hereunder prior to the execution of the contract, shall be a condition of the federal financial assistance provided to the project, binding upon the applicant or recipient for such assistance, its successors and assigns. The Borrower shall maintain documentation which demonstrates compliance with hour and wage requirements of this part. Such documentation shall be made available to the County for review upon request.

The subrecipient agrees that, except with respect to the rehabilitation or construction of residential property containing less than eight (8) units, all contractors engaged under contracts in excess of \$2,000 for construction, renovation or repair work financed in whole or in part with assistance provided under this contract, shall comply with Federal requirements adopted by the County pertaining to such contracts and with the applicable requirements of the regulations of the Department of Labor under 29 CFR Parts 1, 3, 5, and 7 governing the payment of wages and ratio of apprentices and trainees to journeyman workers and ensure that all workers associated with the contract are paid the prevailing wage in accordance with the Department of Labor Wage Determination Number applicable for each project. If wage rates higher than those required under the regulations are imposed by state or local law, nothing hereunder is intended to relieve the borrower of its obligation, if any, to required payment of the higher wage. The borrower shall cause or require to be inserted in full, in all such contracts subject to such regulations, provisions meeting the requirements of this paragraph."

10 CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT PROVISION: As stated in 24 CFR 85.36:

Where applicable, all contracts awarded by grantees and borrowers in excess of \$2,000 for construction contracts and in excess of \$2,500 for other contracts which involve the employment o mechanics or laborers shall include a provision for compliance with Section 103 and 107 of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 USC 327-330) as supplanted by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5). Under Section 103 of the Act each contractor shall be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard workday or workweek is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than 1-1/2 times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 8 hours in any calendar day or 40 hours in the work week. Section 107 of the Act is applicable to construction work and provides that no laborer or mechanic shall be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous, or dangerous to his health and safety as determined under construction, safety and health standards promulgated by the Secretary of Labor. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.

This material is presented in the Labor Standards Handbook 6500.3, Exhibit 14. These provisions should be contained in each bid document and referenced in each contract.

CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT: The subrecipient, if the contract is in excess of \$2,000, and any of his subcontractors, shall comply with Section 103 and 107 of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. 327-330) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations contained in 29 CFR Parts 3, 5, and 5a. Under Section 103 of the Act, the borrower and any of subcontractors shall be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work day of eight hours and a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard workday or workweek is permissible, provided the worker is compensated at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of eight hours in any calendar day or forty hours in any work week. Section 5 of the Federal Labor Standards

Provision, HUD Form 4010 and 4010.1 attached and incorporated herein, sets forth in detail the Section 103 requirements.

Section 107 of the Act provides that no labor or mechanic shall be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous, or dangerous to his health and safety, as determined under construction, safety and health standards promulgated by the Secretary of Labor. These requirements do not apply to the purchases of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market.

11 ACCESS TO RECORDS AND RECORD RETAINAGE CLAUSE: In general, all official project records and document must be maintained during the operation of this project and for a period of four years following close-out in compliance with 24 CFR 570.502(a)(16). The North Carolina Department of Commerce - Division of Community Assistance, the North Carolina Department of Treasurer, U.S. Department o Housing and Urban Development, the Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their duly authorized representatives, shall have access to any books, documents, papers and records of the Administering Agency which are pertinent to the execution of this Agreement, for the purpose of making audits, examinations, excerpts and transcriptions in compliance with the above Rule.

12 CLEAN WATER, CLEAN AIR, E.O. 11738 AND EPA REGULATIONS PROVISIONS Compliance with Air and Water Acts. This agreement is subject to the requirements of the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 1857 et seq., the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq. and the regulations of the Environmental Protection Agency with respect thereto, at 40 CFR Part 15, as amended from time to time. The borrower and any of its subcontractors for work funded under this Agreement which is in excess of \$100,000 agree to the following requirements:

- 1. A stipulation by the borrower or subcontractors that any facility to be utilized in the performance of any nonexempt contract or subcontract is not listed on the List of Violating Facilities issued by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) pursuant to 40 CFR 15.20
- 2. Agreement by the borrower to comply with the requirements of Section 114 of the Clean Air Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. 1857c-8) and Section 308 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, (33 U.S.C. 1318) relating to inspection, monitoring, entry, reports, and information, as well as all other requirements specified in said Section 114 and Section 308, and all regulations and guidelines issued thereunder.
- 3. A stipulation that as a condition for the award of the contact prompt notice will be given of any notification received from the Director, Office of Federal Activities, EPA, including that a facility utilized or to be utilized for the contract is under consideration to be listed on the EPA List of Violating Facilities.
- 4. Agreement by the borrower that he will include or cause to be included the criteria and requirements in paragraph 1 though 4 of this section in every nonexempt subcontract and requiring that the borrower will take such action as the Government may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions.

In no event shall any amount of the assistance provided under this Agreement be utilized with respect to a facility which has given rise to a conviction under Section 113(c)(1) of the Clean Air Act or Section 309(c) of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act.

LEAD-BASED PAINT CLAUSE: The subrecipient is hereby specifically made aware of the HUD 14 Lead Based Paint regulations at 24 CFR 570.608 and 24 CFR Part 35, which are applicable to the construction or rehabilitation of residential structures. To the extent that the subject matter of this contract involves residential structures, the borrower will comply with the lead-based paint

regulations.

15 LOBBY CLAUSES: Required by Section 1352, Title 31, U.S. Code

No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or shall be paid, by or on behalf of it, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreements;

If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or shall be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, it shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions;

This certification is a material representative of fact upon which reliance was placed with this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by Section 1352, Title 31, U.S.C. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$10,000 for each such failure.

- 16 <u>PROGRAM INCOME</u>: The use of program income by borrower shall comply with the requirements set forth as 24 CFR 570.504. By way of further limitations, borrower may use such income during the contract period for activities permitted under this contract and shall reduce requests for additional funds by the amount of any such program income balances on hand. The County may require remittance of unused program income at the end of the contract period. Any interest earned on cash advances from the U.S. Treasury is not program income and shall be identified, and shall be remitted promptly to the Grantee.
- 17 <u>REVERSION OF ASSETS:</u> Subrecipient shall maintain real property inventory records which clearly identify properties purchased, improved or sold. Properties retained shall continue to meet eligibility criteria and shall conform to the "changes in use" restrictions specified in accordance with 24 CFR Parts 570.503(b) (7).

SUBJECT: PURSUING LEGISLATION TO ESTABLISH COUNTY SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE PROGRAM

BACKGROUND

Prior to meeting with the N.C. Legislative Delegation on March 9, commissioners were asked to submit items they wanted included on the state legislative agenda.

Commissioner Jimmy Keefe requested that the County discuss pursuing legislative action that mirrors House Bill 198/Session Law 2017-81 - "An Act to Amend the Chatter of the City of Fayetteville to Authorize the City to Establish a Small Business Enterprise Program to Promote the Development of Small Businesses in the City and Enhance the Opportunities for Small Businesses to Participate in City Contracts."

The item below was included in a DRAFT 2018 State Legislative Agenda approved by the Policy Committee on Feb. 15, 2018; and appeared on the consent agenda for the Board of Commissioners meeting on Feb. 19, 2018.

Consider pursuing legislative action to allow Cumberland County the flexibility to participate with local companies and vendors through a small business enterprise program like the legislative action approved last year for the City of Fayetteville. (Session Law 2017-81)

Commissioner Adams asked that the small business enterprise program item be removed from the State Legislative Agenda and referred to the Finance Committee on March 1 for consideration prior to discussing with the legislative delegation. A copy of the City's legislation, which was ratified on June 29, 2017, was presented, along with information on how the City implemented their program.

The Finance Committee moved to not pursue state legislative action to establish a County Small Local Business Enterprise program, but rather to implement measures that would encourage local companies and

vendors to compete for and obtain county contracts.

The Finance Director will develop these measures and bring them back to the committee.

The item was not included in the state legislative agenda presented to the Cumberland County delegation on March 9.

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

Approve the Finance Committee's recommendation not to seek legislative action but to implement a small business enterprise program and wait to see the ramifications. The committee agreed that the Finance Director will develop implementation steps tailored to the County.

2. CONSIDERATION OF ANNUAL SCHOOL FUNDING FOR THE CUMBERLAND COUNTY SCHOOL SYSTEM

BACKGROUND:

At the February 15, 2018 special meeting of the Finance Committee, the Committee moved the consideration of the current school funding agreement forward to the March 1, 2018 Committee

meeting. As you may recall, the current funding agreement with the Cumberland County School System(CCSS) expires June 30, 2018. This funding agreement allows both the County and CCSS to more accurately plan and prepare annual budgets. The current agreement provides CCSS revenue derived from \$0.3406 on the County's ad valorem property tax rate.

However, for FY18 the agreement held the school system harmless for revaluation resulting in 0.36 on the property tax rate being distributed to CCSS or 80,362,412 [see option #3 below]. The agreement also provides that actual taxes collected above the budget are split 75% (County) / 25% (CCSS).

Management proposed freezing the funding for CCSS at the FY17 level of \$79,463,109. This reflects the cumulative enrollment decrease of approximately 1.10% over the past 5 years. This recommendation led to discussion of additional options that the Committee may wish to explore.

Summary of potential options:

- 1. Freeze funding for 2 years at **\$79,463,109**. This represents a 1.1% reduction from the hold harmless level of FY18.
- 2. Enter into 3-year funding agreement based on funding formula of existing agreement:

Note: Amount is what CCSS would have received in FY18 without hold harmless clause.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Management recommends renewing the annual CCSS funding agreement based on one of the options from prior Committee discussions with no additional distribution of taxes collected above budget.

Melissa Cardinali, Assistant County Manager, referenced the background information recorded above and provided the following presentation on a funding options update. Ms. Cardinali stated the belief of county and school system staff is that the funding option should be measurable, sustainable and predictable. Ms. Cardinali stated the FY17 number of \$79,463,109 for the funding option based on DPI allotted ADM was chosen because it was the last funding formula before revaluation and results in \$1,575 funding per allotted ADM. Ms. Cardinali stated the ADM number comes out in March, so it is available for budget purposes. Ms. Cardinali stated this formula would be used for FY19, FY20 and FY21.

Ms. Cardinali stated as a point of reference, had those numbers been used for this fiscal year the funding for schools would have been \$79,513,875 which is about \$51,000 more than the schools received in FY17, so it would not have been a reduction. Ms. Cardinali stated she would anticipate based on budget that as the ADM goes up, the funding allotment would also go up. Ms. Cannon stated this option also takes out the complexity of basing school funding on property tax values.

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Commissioner Faircloth asked whether the hold harmless could be done away with if the formula is negotiated. Ms. Cardinali responded in the affirmative. Commissioner Faircloth stated he favored leaving the percentage of taxes the same and doing away with the hold harmless for three years.

Commissioner Adams stated if you look at the DPI formula, the schools with high poverty will fail and commissioners cannot continue to let those schools fail or not meet the criteria for the state's grading. Commissioner Adams also stated he did not think the school system's banking funds in fund balance was a good use of those funds. Commissioner Faircloth stated at present school enrollment is not increasing and is likely decreasing, and the problem he sees with ADM is that there could be a decrease in funding from the County after the first year which could result in budget issues for the schools. Commissioner Lancaster stated another concern is related to students who may start the school year in a charter or private school and end up coming back into the public-school system. Ms. Cardinali stated the allotted numbers are distributed by DPI specifically for budget purposes and are typically a little higher than the actual numbers that are reported at year end. Following discussion, Commissioner Adams asked staff to report back during budget to see the effect of the formula and to determine whether adjustments need to be made.

3. CONSIDERATION OF HEALTH INSURANCE PLAN FOR FY18-19

BACKGROUND:

Chernoff Diamond will attend the March 1, 2018 committee meeting to discuss what has transpired since their engagement in November 2017 as well as provide recommendations for the FY19 plan.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION: Consideration of FY19 plan recommendations as presented.

Ms. Cardinali referenced the County's migration to the current arrangement with Cherry Bekaert and Chernoff Diamond, and introduced Kyle Frigon, Director of Benefits and Risk Management for Cherry Bekaert, and Kevin Quinn, Parnter with Chernoff Diamond.

Mr. Frigon reviewed the progress to date and timeline for high level projects outlined in the Executive Summary below. Mr. Frigon stated claims reports are being reviewed and underwriters are working to be sure the numbers are accurate, projected and predictable. Mr. Frigon stated a market study is being conducted for ancillary coverages to be sure products and benefits paid for

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by the employees are the best and most efficient available. Mr. Frigon stated the Cape Fear Valley Medical Center option is also being explored and the hospital system believes that a July 1 effective date to move into that process is unrealistic so the option is being explored for future dates.

Mr. Quinn reviewed FY2018 financials and projected estimates for the FY2019 renewal as outlined below stating the differential appears to be -3.3%. Mr. Quinn stated it is fair, reasonable and responsible to have a reserve fund, but the question is whether it needs to be \$6 million.

Mr. Quinn highlighted underwriting details for the prior and current periods as outlined below and stated it will likely be consistent next year and is fair and reasonable to budget. Mr. Quinn stated underwriting and looking at claims is a predictable event based on 5,000 claimants and the County pays for individual stop-loss insurance for all claims over \$150,000 which is important to continue.

Mr. Quinn provided the following medical renewal summary and stated the fixed cost increase is purely due to a stop loss increase which is a moving number each year and the most volatile piece in insurance because the company is taking a greater risk. Mr. Quinn stated it is important to have this protection in place and the aggregate hard dollar increase of \$250,000 is being negotiated with BCBS NC. Mr. Quinn stated the administration cost remains at current and for budgeting purposes, a margin of 5% or about \$950,000 was added to expected claims and included the -3.3% differential based on existing claims. Mr. Quinn stated based on 5,000 claimants, the underwriting calculation should not miss by more than 5%. Mr. Quinn stated there should always be a reserve fund but some of the \$6 million may be able to be released from that reserve fund and used for other things; this is the Board's call.

Mr. Quinn responded to questions and stated what he is explaining is how most organizations of the County's size would do their planning and many do not have a reserve fund that is 33% of expected claims. Mr. Quinn stated it is a big fund and perhaps the County wants to take another year or two to look at it. Mr. Quinn stated Chernoff Diamond is trying to make sure they are coaching the County appropriately and being fiscally responsible. Mr. Quinn stated the County may be more comfortable using some of the reserve funds for other things in the future, but the underwriting calculation should not miss by 33%.

Questions and comments followed. Ms. Cannon requested action on the recommendations laid out by Chernoff Diamond for the July 1 renewal.

MOTION: Commissioner Adams moved to approve the recommendations as presented. SECOND: Commissioner Faircloth

DISCUSSION: Commissioner Faircloth stated the County has a \$6 million reserve and 5% built in for claims excess and in last year's plan, a lot of first dollar money was removed for specialists which basically hurt a lot the chronically ill who have to go to specialists every three months. Commissioner Faircloth stated although this

resulted in favorable claims experience, money was saved on the backs of the chronically ill. Commissioner Faircloth stated he favors restoring some first dollar money for chronic illness, even though he does not have the numbers and there is no recommendation for that. Commissioner Adams stated he agreed and would like to have the numbers brought back to the April Finance Committee meeting. Mr. Quinn stated a specialist visit is subject to deductible and co-insurance, so they will get an incremental projection of claims based on restoring some kind of co-pay. Mr. Quinn stated the co-pay is usually double the primary care co-pay. Mr. Quinn stated they will also look back and see what the average claim dollar was over the last two years on the actual experience for specialists.

Commissioner Adams withdrew his motion sand stated action could be tabled to the next meeting of the Finance Committee. Commissioner Keefe asked whether the matter was time sensitive and could be tabled. Ms. Cardinali stated as long as action is no later than the April meeting because any changes will need to be communicated to employees and open enrollment will need to proceed. Commissioner Adams stated since there does not appear to be any objections to the recommendations, he will offer a motion and after receiving the numbers in April, it can be amended should there be a desire to do so.

proviso as presented.SECOND:Commissioner Faircloth

4. CONSIDERATION OF FINDINGS FROM FOLLOW-UP AUDIT OF WOMEN'S PROGRAMS AT THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT

BACKGROUND:

Internal Audit has completed a follow-up audit of the Women's Programs at the Health Department for the time period of July 1, 2017 – December 31, 2017. The report for the audit is being submitted for review at this time.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Staff recommends accepting the Internal Audit report for the Women's Programs at the Health Department.

Tammy Gillis, Internal Audit Director and Wellness Coordinator, stated this audit is a follow-up on the Cumberland County Public Health Department Women's Clinic procedures for notifying patients of abnormal breast and cervical exam results. Ms. Gillis explained the Women's Clinic consists of the Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Program (BCCCP), Family Planning and Maternity. Ms. Gillis stated the Cumberland County BCCCP Progress Report from DHHS and contracted lab company reports from July 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017 were used to perform a 100% review. Ms. Gillis also stated the Cumberland County Health Department

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Abnormal Pap Smear Follow-Up Procedure for BCCCP, Family Planning and Maternity were used as guidelines to determine timely notification of abnormal results.

Ms. Gillis provided the following audit report:

BREAST AND CERVICAL CANCER CONTROL PROGRAM (BCCCP)

There were no patients with abnormal cervical exams from July 1 through December 31, 2017 in the BCCCP.

There were five patients with abnormal mammogram results on the Cumberland County BCCCP Progress Reports for July 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017. All five patients were notified timely.

<u>FINDING:</u>

The BCCCP does not have a written Health Department policy for notifying patients with abnormal mammogram results. There is a State policy for BCCCP, but Health Department staff utilize the same notification policy for abnormal mammograms that is used for notification of abnormal cervical exam results.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Health Department staff should adopt a written Health Department policy for notifying patients with abnormal mammogram results.

FAMILY PLANNING CLINIC

There were 53 patients with abnormal cervical exam results on the contracted lab company reports for July 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017.

The Health Department's policy for notification of abnormal cervical exam results:

- 1) 1st notification will be telephone call to patient and documented in patient electronic health record (EHR). This will be done within 3 business days of receiving labs from Provider.
- 2) If no response from 1st telephone call within 2 business days, 1st notification letter is sent to patient. This is documented in patient EHR.
- If no response from 1st letter and telephone call in 7 business days, a 2nd telephone call and final attempt letter will be sent via certified mail. This is documented in the patient EHR.
- 4) When patient is contacted, counseling/education is initiated.
- 5) Copy of all letters will be sent to medical records to be scanned into the patient EHR.

FINDINGS:

Three patients were not notified in a timely manner of their abnormal cervical exam results:

- One patient was notified 50 days late due to oversight by Health Department staff.
- Health Department lab staff reconcile patient lab sheets to ensure that results are received for all patients. The reconciliation was not performed in Sep and Dec 2017. As a result, one patient was notified 83 days late and one patient 38 days late.

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RECOMMENDATION:

The Health Department lab staff should reconcile patient lab sheets to ensure that Clinics can adhere to their notification policies.

MATERNITY CLINIC

There were 12 patients with abnormal cervical exam results on the contracted lab company reports for July 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017.

The Health Department's policy for notification of abnormal cervical exam results:

- 1) The patient is informed of the abnormal pap result and need for follow-up during her next prenatal appointment (pnv).
- 2) If it is urgent and patient needs to be seen immediately, the nurse calls the patient to inform her of her results and need for follow-up.
- 3) If the patient does not return to clinic and/or cannot be reached by telephone after two attempts on two different days, the nurse will attempt to contact patient via emergency contact; if no response within 10 days, a letter will be sent to the patient.
- If no response from 1st letter within 10 days, telephone call is attempted to patient, if no response, 2nd notification letter is sent and
- 5) If no response from 1st and 2nd letter, and telephone call in 10 days, a Final Attempt letter will be sent via certified mail
- 6) At discretion of the clinic provider, a 2nd certified letter may be mailed, if no response, the patient is placed inactive.

FINDINGS:

Two patients were not notified in a timely manner of their abnormal cervical exam results:

- One patient was not informed at their next prenatal visit following the abnormal exam results. The patient was informed at their second prenatal visit, which was 90 days late.
- One patient that missed their next prenatal visit after the abnormal result was received was informed at their rescheduled prenatal visit, which was 14 days late.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Maternity Clinic Health Department staff should follow their written policy of notifying patients with abnormal results.

CONCLUSION:

All Findings and Recommendations have been discussed with the Health Department Women's Clinic staff and all patients have now been notified of abnormal results.

Questions followed. Ms. Gillis stated the report has been given to Interim Health Department Director Duane Holder who will respond to the findings.

MOTION: Commissioner Faircloth moved to accept the internal audit report on the Cumberland County Public Health Department Women's Clinic.
 SECOND: Commissioner Adams
 VOTE: UNANIMOUS (3-0)

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Mr. Holder informed the Committee that the outliers who were not notified in a timely manner are currently being dealt with and stated the definition of timely is spelled out in the policy because the state does not have a definition of timely notification. Mr. Holder stated this audit report has been shared internally and will be shared with the Board of Health at its next meeting. Mr. Holder stated currently there is no comprehensive reporting mechanism for reporting to the Board of Health and a dashboard of typical indicators will be implemented in an effort to pull in and further engage the Board of Health. Mr. Holder stated he plans to have at the next meeting of the committee a proposal from the outside risk manager on costs to engage representatives to find the remaining 30 individuals not contacted and should there be interest, a similar type proposal for engagement to conduct an outside review. Mr. Holder responded to questions from Commissioner Evans.

5. CONSIDERATION OF SELECTION OF COUNSEL TO PURSUE OPIOID LITIGATION

BACKGROUND:

As a measure of the extent of the opioid crisis in our County, I have included in the attachments data on opioid prescription rates and opioid poisoning deaths which are posted on the NCACC's website. The data shows, that although Cumberland County ranks in the bottom one-third of all counties for opioid pills per resident and opioid prescriptions per resident, it still had the fifth highest number of opioid poisoning deaths among all counties in 2015, the last year for which data has been published on this website. The rankings for all counties with more than 30 opioid poisoning deaths for 2015 were:

Based on the relative populations, it might be expected that Cumberland would rank in the top six counties for opioid poisoning deaths; however; this result is surprising with Cumberland's low ranking in the prescription use data. At the February 15, 2018, Finance Committee meeting, Commissioner Adams asked for information on the source of the data posted on the NCACC's website. The data is from the CDC US Prescribing Rate Maps with the prescribing data source being QuintilesIMS Transactional Data Warehouse (TDW). That data is based on a sample of approximately 59,000 retail (non-hospital) pharmacies, which dispense nearly 88% of all retail prescriptions in the U.S. For this database, a prescription is an initial or refill prescription dispensed at a retail pharmacy in the sample, and paid for by commercial insurance, Medicaid, Medicare, or cash or its equivalent. The database does not include mail order pharmacy data. The population data is derived from the official annual estimate of population on July 1 by the Census Bureau. Military personnel are included in the official estimate in the same manner as they are counted in the decennial census.

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All these opioid cases against manufacturers or distributors filed in any U. S. District Court have been assigned to a judge in the Northern District of Ohio as multi-district litigation. That will happen with any case filed by Cumberland in the Eastern District of North Carolina.

The NCACC has been very active in assisting counties with the response to the opioid crisis. As of January 22, 2018, the NCACC reported that 22 counties had either filed suit or were in the process of selecting counsel to do so. The county attorney is aware of at least five other counties becoming involved in this process since that date. Staff at the NCACC interviewed a number of national law firms and groups of national law firms and selected two of those groups of law firms to make presentations to the state's county attorneys at a forum in November, 2017. Cumberland County has received proposals from each of those groups. A synopsis of each proposal follows:

The McHugh Fuller Group:

The group of national firms and local counsel for which Michael Jay Fuller, Jr., Esq., has been designated lead counsel are fully identified in the proposed contract which is attached. Local attorneys William O. Richardson, Esq., and Terry Hutchens, Esq., have been identified as the contact attorneys for Cumberland County. This group will sue the manufacturers and distributors. The abatement of the opioid epidemic as a public nuisance is one of many causes of action this group will pursue. That is the reason they require the counties they represent to adopt a resolution declaring the opioid crisis a public nuisance which must be abated. The resolution this group has requested is attached. Note that Bladen and Columbus Counties are identified as neighboring counties in which the prescription rates are much higher than the state average. The City of Fayetteville has contracted with this group to pursue opioid litigation.

The Crueger Dickinson Group:

The group of national firms and local counsel for which Erin Dickinson, Esq., has been a spokesperson in N.C. are fully identified in the proposed contract which is attached. Although this group has engaged Janet Ward Black, Esq., of Greensboro as local counsel in North Carolina, they have agreed to engage a Cumberland County attorney as local counsel for Cumberland County. They have proposed engaging Mike Williford of the Williford, Hollers, Crenshaw, Boliek & Frangakis Law Firm as local counsel but have expressed their willingness to engage any local counsel the Board of Commissioners prefers. This group intends to only sue the manufacturers which are identified in the proposed contract. They have not asked for a declaration of public nuisance but have asked for a resolution in support of the litigation which is attached. This group did tailor the resolution to fit the data for Cumberland County.

Both Groups:

The contract terms for both groups are now basically the same. Each is a 25% contingency fee contract with the fee to be applied to the gross amount of any recovery with the costs of litigation to be reimbursed from the balance after deducting the attorneys' fees. Each will provide defense for any counterclaims or claims for sanctions at no additional fee. Neither contract requires the county to expend any funds for attorneys' fees or costs except out of monies received out of settlement with or a judgment against the defendants. Under either of these contracts, the county could be liable for damages or attorney fees to the defendants if the defendants prevailed on any motion for sanctions or a counterclaim. Each of these groups of firms has experience with opioid and multi-district litigation and each is exceptionally qualified to pursue this litigation.

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Other Options:

The Board does not have to choose either of these firms to pursue this litigation; however; at this time no other counties have filed suit with a firm other than one of these. Alamance County has done a RFP for counsel and is in the selection process. The Catawba County Attorney was designated as local counsel for the McHugh Fuller Group and has already filed suit. Included in the attachments is the resolution that was adopted by Buncombe County on November 7, 2017, as an example of a resolution that was drafted by the county and specific to that county's circumstances. Buncombe was the first North Carolina County to file a lawsuit. This information is provided for the Board to understand that it has a range of options to consider and should proceed as it deems appropriate to Cumberland's circumstances.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

The county attorney recommends the Board select counsel to join the litigation and advises that the two groups of firms whose proposals are summarized above are as qualified as any firm that might be solicited with a RFP. If the Board is satisfied with either of these proposals, the Board should proceed to select one of these groups as counsel under the terms of the proposals as presented or subject to such further conditions as the Board deems appropriate.

Mr. Moorefield referenced the information he provided and stated the first issue is to address a question posed earlier by Commissioner Adams regarding CDC data. Mr. Moorefield stated the CDC data is from a fiscal sample of 59,000 pharmacies across the United States that dispense 88% of the prescriptions in the country. Mr. Moorefield stated it is the only source of data, everyone is using it and it does not include hospital pharmacies. Mr. Moorefield stated the second issue is the selection of counsel. Mr. Moorefield explained the limited role of local counsel. Mr. Moorefield stated his recommendation is for the Board to designate the County Attorney as local counsel and to select the Crueger-Dickinson Firm because their litigation approach is more in line with the data Cumberland County has from the CDC. Mr. Moorefield stated Cumberland County does not have data to substantiate damages and the damages model used by the Crueger-Dickson Firm is based on a John Hopkins Medical School community damages model. Mr. Moorefield stated the case is being transferred and heard in the northern district of Ohio and most of what has happened thus far is procedural related to cases around the country being consolidated into this action. Questions and discussion followed.

Commissioner Adams stated a nuisance has to be declared and he is prepared to make a motion to let the County Attorney proceed with that because everyone has been bombarded by local firms. Commissioner Adams stated before a national firm is hired, local firms need to be given an opportunity to make a presentation.

- MOTION: Commissioner Adams moved to allow the county attorney to proceed at this time and if there are local people that have a national firm, then they submit and a determination can be made at the next Finance Committee meeting.
- SECOND: Commissioner Faircloth

DISCUSSION: Commissioner Keefe stated Mr. Moorefield is recommending a national firm. Commissioner Adams stated his motion did not include a national firm and come to the committee with a proposal. Commissioner Faircloth stated based on the way he is reading it, the national firm hires their local counsel. Commissioner Adams stated so if these local people want to engage with whatever firm, that's on them. Commissioner Faircloth stated then local people do not have to bring proposals to the county and the committee will delay a recommendation for hiring. Commissioner Adams stated that is right and it will come back to the Finance Committee in April. Questions and additional discussion followed. Commissioner Keefe asked whether there would be a motion creating a nuisance. Mr. Moorefield stated a nuisance should not be declared because one of the firms is not using a nuisance approach. Mr. Moorefield clarified whether he was to bring back a final proposal from these two firms with local counsel. Commissioner Adams responded in the affirmative.

Commissioner Adams withdrew his motion. Commissioner Faircloth stated he only seconded the motion for discussion. Commissioner Keefe stated with no motion on the table, this matter will be tabled until the April meeting of the Finance Committee.

6. CONSIDERATION OF PURSUING LEGISLATION TO ESTABLISH COUNTY SMALL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE PROGRAM

BACKGROUND:

The Board of Commissioners will meet with the N.C. Legislative Delegation on March 9 at 8:30 a.m. in Room 119 of the Judge E. Maurice Braswell Courthouse. Commissioners were asked to submit items they wanted included on the state legislative agenda.

Commissioner Jimmy Keefe requested that the County discuss pursuing legislative action that mirrors House Bill 198/Session Law 2017-81 – "An Act to Amend the Charter of the City of Fayetteville to Authorize the City to Establish a Small Business Enterprise Program to Promote the Development of Small Businesses in the City and Enhance the Opportunities for Small Businesses to Participate in City Contracts."

The item below was included in a DRAFT 2018 State Legislative Agenda approved by the Policy Committee on Feb. 15, 2018; and appeared on the consent agenda for the Board of Commissioners meeting on Feb. 19, 2018.

Consider pursuing legislative action to allow Cumberland County the flexibility to participate with local companies and vendors through a small business enterprise program like the legislative action approved last year for the City of Fayetteville. (Session Law 2017-81)

Commissioner Adams asked that the small business enterprise program item be removed from the State Legislative Agenda and referred to the Finance Committee on March 1 for consideration prior to discussing with the legislative delegation.

A copy of the City's legislation, which was ratified on June 29, 2017 has been provided along with information on how the City has implemented their program. The information provided also includes a presentation by the School of Government on "Local Preferences in Public contracting: Legal Limitations and HB198 and the resolution establishing the Small Local Business Enterprise Program.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Consider whether Cumberland County should pursue legislative action to allow it the flexibility to participate with local companies and vendors through a small business enterprise program.

Sally Shutt, Assistant County Manager, referenced information on how the City implemented their small business enterprise program. Commissioner Adams stated although he does not have a problem with what the City implemented, it has absolutely nothing to do with the legislation that says you can take one bidder over another bidder. Commissioner Adams stated the reason he asked to have this removed from the State Legislative Agenda was because it will drive up costs. Commissioner Adams stated if local bidders are selected over lower-cost outside bidders, outside bidders will cease to bid. Commissioner Adams stated he would like to see how it works out for the City and PWC and whether it has a financial impact. Commissioner Adams stated it will also be short-sighted for local businesses because when other counties do the same thing, local businesses will not be able to compete in those markets. Commissioner Adams stated the longterm effects have not been considered. Commissioner Keefe stated the idea was to mirror the City's approach and establish a culture of working with local businesses. Commissioner Keefe stated poverty ceases when jobs happen and because the Board has responsibility for good stewardship, he would not support a higher bid just to go local. Commissioner Adams stated he concurred with Commissioner Keefe's comments but feels it is all speculative. Commissioner Adams stated he thinks the implementation needs to take place because that can be done without the bill, and then wait and see what happens in terms of cost.

- MOTION: Commissioner Adams moved to do the implementation but not the bill and wait to see the ramifications.SECOND: Commissioner Faircloth
- VOTE: UNANIMOUS (3-0)

Ms. Cannon asked if the Committee would allow the Finance Director to come up with some program implementation steps tailored to the County instead of accepting the City's. Consensus followed. Commissioner Keefe confirmed the legislation will not be on the State Legislative Agenda.

(11) Capital Outlay 43.1% - Board of Elections capital equipment and FTCC capital outlay budgeted but not incurred or encumbered makes up the majority of unutilized budget.

- 1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES FEBRUARY 1, 2018 REGULAR MEETING AND FEBRUARY 15, 2018 SPECIAL MEETING
- MOTION: Commissioner Evans moved to approve the February 1, 2018 regular meeting minutes and the February 15, 2018 special meeting minutes as presented.

- 2. CONSIDERATION OF NUISANCE ACTION AGAINST HOTELS ON HIGHWAY 301

BACKGROUND

At its February 15, 2018 meeting the Policy Committee received a report from Sheriff Wright on the number of calls his officers were dispatched to the Carolina Motor Inn and the Coliseum Inn during the last six months of 2017. The Committee directed the county attorney to work with the sheriff's attorney to develop a plan of action for addressing these two properties in close proximity to the Crown Coliseum as nuisances. The county attorney requested the sheriff's attorney to obtain more detailed information on the number and nature of these dispatches. The sheriff's attorney provided that information for the period from January 1, 2015 through February 12, 2018. The county attorney's office has summarized those dispatches and categorized each as to whether the event could be a chargeable criminal offense recorded below. The characterization of these calls as to chargeable criminal offenses is an important element of the way the County might pursue nuisance actions against these properties.

As to the Carolina Motor Inn, Exhibit 1 shows there were 732 total calls dispatched with 223 of those being for events that may have been chargeable criminal offenses. These resulted in 36 incident reports made by the investigating officers and 11 arrests for criminal charges. None of these arrests resulted in a conviction or guilty plea.

As to the Coliseum Inn, Exhibit 1 shows there were 1,081 total calls dispatched with 297 of those being for events that may have been chargeable criminal offenses. These resulted in 62 incident reports made by the investigating officers and 12 arrests for criminal charges. Of these 12 arrests, one defendant pled guilty to injury to real property and ethnic intimidation. Six of these 12 cases are still pending in court.

There are only two methods the county may use to pursue nuisance abatement under these circumstances. Each is discussed separately as follows:

G.S. 153A-140. Abatement of public health nuisance:

This is a very straightforward, short statute that authorizes the county "to remove, abate or remedy everything that is dangerous or prejudicial to the public health or safety." The county attorney is not aware of any cases that have been brought under this statute for <u>activities</u> conducted on a property. It is typically used for <u>conditions</u> located upon a property. If, however, the evidence supports proceeding under this statute, the action could be undertaken this way. This process begins with the Board of Commissioners declaring the existence of a public nuisance. The Board must be give notice to the owner and conduct a hearing for the owner to present evidence and be heard. The Board makes findings of fact based on the evidence submitted at the hearing and enters an order appropriate to those findings of fact. The owner may appeal the Board's order to the Superior Court, at which point the process becomes a judicial process. If the court rules that the conditions do not constitute a public nuisance, the county may be held liable for the owner's attorney's fees and litigation cost.

Chapter 19. Offenses Against Public Morals:

This is very detailed group of statutes contained in Chapter 19 of the General Statutes which authorizes counties to pursue nuisance actions against properties on which specified sorts of criminal activity is regularly occurring. When there is evidence to support the existence of the specified criminal activity, this is the most appropriate process to use. The Board of Commissioners is only involved in declaring the nuisance. It then proceeds as a civil court action brought in the name of the State of North Carolina, typically by a request to the District Attorney. A very significant aspect of this process is that an admission or finding of guilt against any person under the criminal laws against lewdness, assignation, prostitution, gambling, breaches of the peace, illegal possession or sale of alcoholic beverages or controlled substances is admissible for proving the existence of the nuisance. This is the evidence that is typically used to pursue these actions. Like the other statutory nuisance abatement process, if the court rules the activity does not constitute a public nuisance, the county may be liable for the owner's attorney's fees and litigation costs.

Commissioner Evans stated this has been an ongoing problem out near the Crown Coliseum regarding motels. Commissioner Evans stated he invited individuals that are very concerned about this area to come to the meeting to share their concerns. Commissioner Evans stated he would like to see a nuisance abatement started on these facilities.

Ms. Kimberly Griffin, part of the Community Watch program for the area, stated the motels on Gillespie Street affect their neighborhood in a very negative way. Ms. Griffin stated drug dealers, drug users, prostitutes and sex offenders are attracted to this area. Ms. Griffin stated she believes the motels are bad for her neighborhood and bad for the future growth of Fayetteville.

Commissioner Evans stated there are several small children living at these facilities and it is not safe. Commissioner Adams stated he does not think deplorable living areas means you have the right to pursue abatement against the property and he does not think that is what the statute calls for in this situation. Commissioner Adams stated he would like to see the county exhaust all remedies available before we look into abatement. Commissioner Adams stated the statute should be followed closely and he does not want to see this done hastily to be sure everyone is protected. Commissioner Evans stated he believes the Sheriff's Office has already exhausted all means and avenues.

Commissioner Lancaster asked the county attorney what the latest recommendation is on this issue. Rick Moorefield, County Attorney, stated the evidence for this area is in the control of the Sheriff's Office. Mr. Moorefield stated Ronnie Mitchell, the Sheriff's Office Attorney, has indicated he will take the lead on this issue. Mr. Moorefield stated before he would recommend the board to declare a nuisance there would have to be admissible evidence and the Sheriff's Office is gathering information. Commissioner Lancaster stated the county attorney and the Sheriff's Office attorney should work together to find any evidence and information necessary to take appropriate action legally to address this problem. Commissioner Adams stated the information should be brought back to the full board to vote on the issue before anyone moves forward. Commissioner Lancaster stated the County will do whatever possible within the law to remedy the situation.

No action taken.

3. PUBLIC INFORMATION AND GOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS MONTHLY UPDATE

BACKGROUND

Each month the Policy Committee will receive an update regarding County communications projects and governmental affairs topics. The March update looks at analytics for the redesigned County website; reports from three intergovernmental committees and legislative topics.

Website Analytics

The County launched its redesigned website on November 2, 2017. Since then, there have been 242,864 visits, with users visiting 2.4 pages and spending an average of 2 minutes per visit. More than 50 percent of the visits are "new visits".

The six most popular pages are the homepage, Tax Administration page, GIS, Tax Administration bill payment options and Public Health.

The two weeks with the highest traffic coincide with the website municipal elections (19,709) and the property tax deadline for payments and listings (January: 19,234).

Intergovernmental Reports

- Homeless Committee
 - An interlocal agreement between the City of Fayetteville and Cumberland County directed the establishment of a Homeless Committee. The purpose and positions were designated in the interlocal agreement approved by the City on June 26, 2017, and the County on October 16, 2017.
 - A Homeless Committee consisting of a member of City Council, a member of the County Commissioners, an Assistant County Manager, Governmental Affairs Officer, Deputy City Manager, Chairman of the Cumberland County Continuum of Care (CoC), City and County Community Development Directors, and the Data & Education Analyst will meet regularly to coordinate and develop strategies to address homelessness through community-wide programs and services.
 - Chairman Larry Lancaster and Councilmember Larry Wright will represent the elected boards on the committee. The first meeting is scheduled for early March.
- Fayetteville Cumberland Liaison Committee
 - The Fayetteville Cumberland Liaison Committee met January 31 at City Hall. The City is the host for the meetings this year. Representatives Billy Richardson and Marvin Lucas; Cumberland County Schools Chairman Carrie Sutton and Deputy Garrison Commander Justin Mitchell attended.
 - The committee directed City and County staff to study a potential City of Fayetteville Extra-Territorial Jurisdiction agreement for the Shaw Heights area authorized by Cumberland County that would give the City authority to regulate development. A report is expected at the next liaison meeting.
- *Mayor's Coalition:*
 - Robert Van Geons and Teddy Warner from the Fayetteville Cumberland County Economic Development Corporation (FCEDC) presented information on the corporation and its activities in the county and the need for "products" – buildings or sites that meet the operational requirements of

companies. The FCEDC is seeking help from the mayors in finding property owners in the county who have sites, especially tracts of more than 250 acres.

- In addition, Falcon Mayor Clifton Turpin, the Coalition Chairman, has asked the County's Graphic Design Information Specialist to assist in creating a logo for the group.
- Legislative Topics:
 - NACO Conference Appointments are being scheduled during the NACo Conference on March 3-7, 2018 for commissioners to meet with Representatives Hudson and Pittenger and staff of Senators Tillis and Burr to talk about funding for water lines in the areas affected by GenX contamination.

Agritourism Information

During the public comment portion of the Board of Commissioners meeting on February 19, 2018 a citizen expressed concern about a proposed ATV park near Linden. Planning Director Tom Lloyd explained that a permit was not needed for the project because it is considered agritourism.

Information provided below was given to the committee from the County Attorney should commissioners have questions for the state delegation on March 9, 2018 when the board hosts the state legislative delegation.

BACKGROUND

GS 153A-340 is the enabling statute for a county's zoning powers. The enabling statute has always exempted property that was used for bona fide farm purposes from zoning regulation. The statute was amended by S.L. 2017-108 to also exempt buildings or structures that are used for agritourism and defines "agritourism". The definition is so broad as to include, "to view or enjoy rural activities". The broadness of that definition is further demonstrated by the description of buildings that can be used for agritourism, which is, "A building or structure used for agritourism includes any building or structure used for public or private events...". It goes on to identify events such as weddings, receptions, meetings, demonstrations of farm activities, meals and other events that are taking place on the farm because of its farm or rural setting.

The zoning issue that arises from this definition of "agritourism" is that it is now difficult to identify any activity occurring on, or any use of, land that qualifies as a bona fide farm that would not be agritourism. Any activity done on rural land can be for viewing or enjoying rural activities and any human activity occurring in a building or structure can be characterized as a public or private event.

RECOMMENDED/PROPOSED ACTION No action is requested at this time.
