SUBJECT: LANDFILL ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE DRAFT PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PLAN FOR ANN STREET LANDFILL

BACKGROUND

The County is considering options for solid waste disposal. Ann Street Landfill has less than eight years of useful life. The course of action is the transfer of solid waste to another disposal facility outside the County while concurrently mining the balefill to increase available capacity of Ann Street for the future. This course of action requires the preparation of an Environmental Justice Report for the Department of Environmental Ouality.

The draft report was presented at the December 8, 2022 Board of Commissioners Agenda Session Meeting. The Environmental Justice report has identified the area surrounding Ann Street as an underserved community and that enhanced engagement is necessary in its Public Participation Plan.



Project Overview and Purpose

The Cumberland County Solid Waste (CCSW) Department is reviewing alternatives for expansion of the Ann Street Landfill, located in Fayetteville, North Carolina. The alternatives allow for increased capacity to accept more waste as the landfill is running out of space. Estimates indicate that, at the frequency and volume of waste being disposed of in the secure landfill, it is likely that it will reach maximum capacity by the year 2030. In accordance with North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (NCDEQ) policies and state statutes, CCSW is conducting an environmental justice review (EJ Report) considering options for expanding more than 10 percent of the current permitted capacity to plan for growth.

The CCSW is assessing the feasibility of expanding the Ann Street Landfill to the west over the existing balefill landfill. A potential alternative to expansion of the Ann Street Landfill or as a short-term measure for diversion of a portion of the waste stream to assist with accommodating the expansion project on site is for CCSW to construct a solid waste transfer station on landfill property. CCSW is reviewing various long-haul options using truck hauling or rail transportation in conjunction with the transfer station for the disposal of waste at out of County landfill facilities. The transfer station could be used for managing municipal solid waste if expansion of the landfill is not feasible.

The purpose of the environmental justice review is to determine whether the proposed project is located within an underserved community and whether project-specific enhanced engagement is necessary to ensure that all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income receive fair treatment and meaningful involvement with respect to the proposed alternatives being considered by the County. The EJ review has identified that the Ann Street Landfill is in an underserved community and that enhanced engagement is necessary in its Public Participation Plan (PPP).

This PPP will document and plan for strategic communications and outreach initiatives to effectively reach the public and maintain engagement throughout the development of the long-term operations plan for the Ann Street Landfill. The purpose of this PPP is to:

- Outline the goals, measurable objectives, tools, and schedule of tactics used for stakeholder engagement and information distribution tasks, and
- Describe how public input from concerned residents, agencies, special interest groups, and government entities will be addressed.



Project Area and Audience Background



Figure 1 Existing Ann Street Landfill

The Ann Street Landfill is located in a largely industrial area, but it is also located in close proximity to established residential communities, schools, and places of worship.

HDR, Inc. prepared an EJ Report (Report) to evaluate demographic and environmental conditions within the community in the one-mile vicinity of the Ann Street Landfill and the potential impacts and benefits landfill expansion would have on the community.

The Ann Street Landfill has been servicing the City of Fayetteville's and Cumberland County's waste management needs for over 40 years. Cumberland County is the fifthmost populous county in North Carolina. Throughout history, the City of Fayetteville is known for its cultural diversity and military presence. The Ann Street Landfill is located at 698 Ann Street in Fayetteville, NC 28301 in Cumberland County.

Cumberland County had a total estimated population of 319,431 individuals. The three most common racial groups within the county were the same as the state with White (47%), Black (35%), and Hispanic or Latino of any race (9%).



The Report indicates the White population ranges from 15 to 69 percent across all the six census tracts (CT) with the Black or African American population ranging from 23 to 76 percent of the population. The share of nonwhites is over 84 percent of the population in CT 38. This CT is the largest in size and extends along railroad tracks to the Harnett County line. The proportion of the Black or African American population within all Census Tracts exceeded both the state and county proportions of 21 and 35 percent, respectively, by more than 10 percent. Similarly, the proportion of American Indian or Alaska Native population within CT 2, CT 14, and CT 38 exceeded both the state and county proportions by more than 10 percent. Individuals who identify as Two or More Races have a higher percentage than the state in all Census Tracts except CT 26. Based on the above analysis all six census tracts are considered to have underserved communities.

The Report shows that all CTs in the project study area except for one, exceed 5 percent of the state or county's percentages for persons considered below poverty level. Based on the poverty rate the majority are **considered to have a notable EJ presence.**

Public Involvement Goals

The primary goal of the public involvement plan is to inform and educate stakeholders about the Ann Street Landfill Long-Term Operations Plan. The project team is committed to:

- Using clear and concise messaging to communicate with project stakeholders and the public.
- Engage with the community so that they can participate in the decision-making process by the County about the long-term operations plan.
- Address the community concerns to the extent practicable through improvements to access, aesthetics, buffers, operations, etc.
- Discuss fair and achievable mitigation strategies to reduce potential impacts on the surrounding community.

Regulatory and Project Requirements

This project meets the criteria to be subject to the NC State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) requirements, which identifies and analyzes potential impacts on natural and human environments.

The project's public involvement is mandated by the NC SEPA and Title VI.

Lead Agency

Cumberland County will serve as the lead agency for the Project. As the lead agency, Cumberland County will be responsible for identifying cooperating agencies and providing opportunities for the public and participating agencies to share input as the Project's purpose and needs are defined. In addition, Cumberland County will be responsible for collaborating with participating agencies to determine acceptable methodologies for analyzing alternatives and the



appropriate level of detail for those studies. Cumberland County will manage the day-to-day activities of the environmental review process, including regular communication with NCDEQ and reviews to ensure that project decisions are supported by the necessary information and fully explained in the environmental document.

Title VI/LEP Outreach & In-Person Engagement for Environmental Justice Communities and Underserved Persons

Cumberland County will identify specific Environmental Justice and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) communities to encourage participation in the Project, solicit and collect input, and comply with Title VI requirements. Bilingual outreach materials will be developed and distributed in these areas to ensure participation and allow members of these communities to provide feedback and engage with the project.

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 – Cumberland County complies with the rules and regulations of Title VI including that "no person shall on the ground of race, color, and national origin be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal funds."

Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) – Accessibility will be a priority for both physically accessible meeting locations and virtually accessible information available online to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Environmental Justice – The project team will identify communities falling within the Environmental Justice category to develop individual and specialized strategies to encourage their participation in the project. Utilizing local media and other outlets that reach low-income and minority communities will be effective outreach methods. Additionally, the project team will continually evaluate and refine outreach methods to increase engagement and participation from these communities.

Other Underserved Populations – The project team will also consider opportunities for engaging with other potentially underserved populations, such as members of refugees or other minority populations.

All outreach and engagement tools and tactics will employ the goals above. Additional outreach to EJ and LEP populations include:

 Translation Services – When a need is anticipated or a request is received for translation or interpretive services, the project team will make all outreach, meeting, and project materials in the appropriate language(s) available and/or interpretation services will be provided.

Federal, State and Local Agency Coordination

Regulations and guidance issued by the Division of Waste Management emphasize the importance of early and effective coordination with federal, state, and local agencies.



The preparation of the environmental justice review requires consideration and compliance with many local, state, and federal rules, regulations, and laws.

Coordination with agencies is expected to occur periodically throughout the process. As part of the environmental justice review process, agencies will have the opportunity to review and provide input on the project's methodology memorandum and content. Throughout the project process, meetings will also be held as necessary with individual agencies to discuss environmental findings and to receive input on the proposed Ann Street Landfill long-term operations plan.

Additional meetings and project briefings may be conducted at the request of elected officials, public agencies and interested stakeholders to discuss specific aspects of the project.

When applicable, this process will be followed:

- Meetings will be held at the request of the concerned party
- Meetings will be approved by Cumberland County
- · Consultant will facilitate the meeting and coordinate any materials provided

The project team will coordinate with agencies with jurisdiction over specific project elements throughout the SEPA process.

Stakeholder Analysis and Key Issue Identification

Target Audience Analysis

The primary audience for the enhanced outreach program are residents who live within a one-mile radius of the Ann Street landfill. The project involves many other stakeholders as well, including citizens, representative leaders, and policy makers from the Cumberland County area. This includes nearby and ongoing plans, research partners, regional utilities, regulatory agencies, political leaders, regional planning organizations, recreational users, and advocacy groups, and those who use transit, live and work in the Cumberland County region. Stakeholder groups include elected officials, City and County commissions and departments, public and business community.


Target audiences will influence early and current supporters, advocates, and users of the system. These audiences are sought out to increase the credibility of the program and to help further educate and engage residents. These groups include elected officials, community influencers, grassroots organizations, and the adjacent communities.

Demographic Assessment

Through publicly available data, HDR compiled additional demographics data within the engagement area to complement the EJ Report. To ensure an inclusive and equitable engagement plan, we did a detailed demographic analysis of the engagement area and determined the following:





Communication tools and tactics will be targeted with messaging that is meaningful to our stakeholders and delivered in places where they spend their time and get their information. As a result, CCSW will see higher engagement rates and effectively educate customers on initiative while investing resources in a purposeful and meaningful way.



Key Issue Identification and Methods to Address

Early identification of key issues is critical for developing project messaging and creating a communication strategy that will be effective and enhance public involvement and stakeholder buy-in. The following includes issues or topics that were identified as those having the potential to raise concern during project. The table also includes various methods for addressing the issues at the onset.

Key Messages

Key messages are statements that engage audiences, encourage project interest, and provide clear, consistent, and concise communication to stakeholders. Key messages for the project will continue to be developed and updated to respond to new project developments. The following key messages will be incorporated into outreach materials and have been developed to serve as consistent framing of key topics throughout the public participation process.

Overview

- Everyday thousands of city and county residents and businesses rely on the Cumberland County Solid Waste Department and Ann Street Landfill for waste and construction and demolition debris disposal.
- The landfill, which has operated at this site since 1980, will reach capacity in just eight years. Before that time, the community will need to plan for waste disposal beyond 2030.
- After thorough study of various possible alternatives, county leaders have concluded that building a transfer station is the most feasible short-term solution, with a long-term goal of expanding the existing landfill facility on site.

Nearby Neighborhoods

- The Ann Street Landfill is located in a largely industrial area, but it is also located in close proximity to some established residential communities. The county is sensitive to the landfill's current and potential impact on these neighbors.
- Cumberland County is engaging with the community to give community members an opportunity to participate in decisions about the long-term operations plan for the landfill.
- The county has engaged HDR, a national firm with expertise in community engagement, to assist with this effort. This public engagement process is designed to understand community concerns and to address them to the extent practicable.
- Cumberland County is dedicated to working with the community to identify fair and achievable mitigation strategies to reduce potential landfill impacts on the surrounding community.

Short-Term vs. Long-Term Solutions

Cumberland County has engaged engineering firms with experience and expertise in landfill construction to study possible alternatives to expanding the landfill at its current site. The primary alternatives studied include the following:

Short-Term Solution: Building a transfer station. This option is the most practicable short-term solution and after a thorough study of potential locations, Ann Street was selected due to the existing infrastructure and proximity to the city. This option would require waste materials to be consolidated and transported to an out-of-county landfill facility. The waste would be hauled by truck or train. For this alternative, the existing baling building or other location on site could be used for a transfer station. This alternative would serve as an effective short-term solution to



divert some waste from the landfill disposal in order to later implement the expansion of the landfill.

Long-Term Solution: Expanding the existing facility. The Ann Street Landfill would be expanded to the west over the existing county unlined landfill property containing baled waste (balefill). This expansion is anticipated to provide 25 years of additional capacity. In this scenario, it would require diverting some of the waste received for disposal in order to provide capacity for balefill waste disposal. This is the most cost-effective and environmentally-friendly solution. Expanding the existing landfill would allow county residents and businesses to continue to benefit from an economical, convenient, revenue-generating, and operation-ready landfill.

Communications Plan

The overall communication strategies create meaningful engagement with all stakeholders through intentional messaging and targeted delivery.

The strategies outlined in this Plan have been designed to be comprehensive and ensure stakeholders are provided multiple opportunities to be informed and engaged as the project progresses.

The intended outcome of strategic communication activities will:

- Inform and engage stakeholders impacted by project activities
- · Generate positive interest in the project
- Create and protect a positive image for the project
- Comply with regulatory requirements for public involvement

Meetings and Events

Targeted Neighborhood and Business Owner Meetings

Informal community meetings with neighborhood organizations and businesses within a onemile radius of the landfill These meetings take the message to the audience at standing or adhoc meetings rather than asking them to come to us.

Open House Information Meeting

Cumberland County will hold an open house information meeting to educate the public and stakeholders, solicit information, and discuss the public's role in decision-making. The open house meeting will be held for the community-at-large to engage with the project team through educational materials. A subsequent online meeting will be held to support the open house meeting for those that prefer to engage online. Educational videos will be developed to reach stakeholders and the public, which will be available on-demand, 24/7. These videos will mirror the information shared for the in-person public meetings.



For Title VI and LEP audiences, the website will include a foreign language translation feature as well as a font enlargement feature. It will comply with Website Accessibility Initiative (WAI) standards and American Disabilities Act (ADA) standards.

Meeting Notices

- Newspaper Legal Ads: public meeting notice legal advertisements will be placed in the main sections of local newspapers. The meeting notice will include the date, time, location, and other general information about the public meeting.
- **Stakeholder Email Invite:** email invites will be sent to all project stakeholders identified in the Stakeholder List to announce the public meeting date.
- **E-newsletter:** e-newsletter will be sent to those on the project mailing list prior to the public meeting.
- Media Releases: press releases will be prepared for the County to distribute with information about the upcoming public meeting or other project milestones.
- Postcard Notification: postcard notifications will be mailed to the public and project stakeholders with information about the upcoming public meeting and online public meeting.

Stakeholder Coordination

Elected Official Outreach

Government and Elected Official's engagement includes communications with local elected officials, key director or manager level staff, and any inter-governmental organizations connected with these individuals. HDR, in coordination with the Cumberland County PIO, will provide elected officials with tools to effectively communicate and champion the system for their constituents and residents.

 Briefings: The communications team will develop templates for both presentations and outreach material available to those who will facilitate the briefings. These briefings will be available at key milestones of the projects. The communications team will identify staff members with existing relationships and determine a schedule throughout the year based on the project calendar and recommended attendance based on existing relationships. These briefings may be conducted one-on-one with officials or in groups. A one-page talking points document will be available as a quick reference for elected officials.

Internal Customer Service Task Outreach

County staff, both in the CCSW and non-CCSW, should be engaged in the initial project research through one-on-one interviews to discover the types of calls they receive regarding landfill and solid waste operation. This vital information may better pinpoint current concerns about the landfill. When the communications plan has been determined, stakeholders should receive a memo and talking points with appropriate responses for public meetings and project



development, as determined by the project team. This will create consistency in messaging and avoid missed outreach opportunities during call transfer. This document should also include reminders about the County's process for handling media inquiries.

Speaker's Bureau

Throughout the project, it is anticipated that requests may be made for presentations to local community groups, neighborhood associations, or other special interest groups in the County. HDR will develop the Speakers' Bureau materials specific to the project for use by the CCSW staff to present to various stakeholder groups. Requests for presentations will come through the project email and be directed to the communications team's appropriate members.

Communication Tools and Tactics

The following tools and tactics will provide a detailed outline of the process used to inform, consult, involve, and collaborate with identified stakeholders.

Social Media

The project team will implement a social media strategy that advertises events, shares relevant project-related media, and educates stakeholders on the initiative through compelling imagery. Social media targeting tools will be utilized to ensure messages are received in stakeholder feeds. Facebook advertisements will be used to target customers through online websites with ads about community in-person and online meetings.

Editorial Calendar

An editorial calendar helps focus the content development and guide communication activities. The consultant will work with the Cumberland County PIO on monthly topics of interest that build upon key messages and use new and existing content assets (video, podcasts, images, illustrations, etc.) if available.

A full social media plan and management protocol are included in Appendix B.

Website

The existing Ann Street Landfill webpage

(https://www.cumberlandcountync.gov/departments/solid-waste-group/solid-waste-management/locations/ann-street-landfill) will be used to share project information. The consultant will provide bi-monthly content updates for CCSW approval that includes graphics to display project information. CCSW will then post approved updates on the site. CCSW may want to consider a landing page specific to these outreach efforts to gauge traffic for this subject. This would enable all information, public meetings, surveys, and content update to be found in one place. A landing page would distinguish this page from typical website visitors.

Project Toolkit

A toolkit of resources will be made available to the County. The toolkit will include a PowerPoint, project handout, and related infographics. These items will be updated throughout the project process to ensure the most up-to-date information is available.



Media

Media management and engagement will be key in shaping the public's perception and opinion of the project. Positive, proactive, and transparent interactions with the media will play a critical part in the project's success by highlighting its strengths and publicizing ongoing outreach efforts.

SMS alerts and API

SMS alerts will be made available as an alternate notification to promote upcoming events and updates on the program.

Cumberland County North Carolina TV (CCNCTV)

Interviews with key project personnel will appear on the county's 24-hour channel that focuses on Cumberland County government.

Media Plan

Media coverage will be a key contributor to the public's perception and opinion of the project. To maintain positivity, proactive and transparent interactions with the media should highlight the project's strengths and the project team's concentrated efforts to involve the public.

Goals

- Maintain and cultivate a positive image for the project.
- Educate and inform the public through media coverage.
- Extend the targeted reach and cultivate supporters for the project.

Media Outreach

Information provided to the media about the project will correspond with outreach opportunities. The County will reach out to media outlets, which could include newspapers, television, and radio, to notify the public about the meetings and other project milestones. These media outlets will receive announcements through press releases, meeting notification flyers, and media advisories.

Amanda Bader and Jermaine Walker will serve as the official project spokespeople in the event of media interviews.

Cumberland County's Sunshine List is included in Appendix C.

All media questions and requests will be received by the public information officer for the County, who will follow up with the project team as necessary to develop a response to questions and requests. The communication team will discuss proactive media pitches related to project status, public involvement opportunities, unique news angles, etc. Press releases and project news will be posted on the project website. The County's Public Information Officer will serve as the media point of contact.

Each fiscal year County departments may have projects that have been approved and initiated but were not complete by the fiscal year end (6/30/22) or items ordered that had not been received by fiscal year end. These projects or items were approved in the Fiscal Year 2022 budget; however, the money was not spent by June 30, 2022.

The following amendment seeks to bring those funds forward from Fiscal Year 2022 into the current fiscal year, allowing departments to complete and pay for these projects and items. This revision is not using 'new' funds but is recognizing the use of FY22 funds in FY23.

BACKGROUND

In collaboration with the Department of Solid Waste, the Cumberland County Department of Emergency Services has submitted a sub-application to North Carolina Emergency Management, Hazard Mitigation Section for the FY22 BRIC grant. The grant project "Comprehensive Vegetative Waste and Emergency Debris Management Plan" aims to develop a 20-year Comprehensive Vegetative Waste Management Plan to evaluate the current operation of the Wilkes Road Facility. Additionally, the project will address how to increase production and optimize an already limited capacity during disaster events which is critical to the recovery process.

The estimated cost of the project is \$150,000.00. We are seeking a federal cost share of \$112,500.00 (75%) and \$7,500 in management cost. Management Cost are 5% of the total cost of the project (\$7,500) paid at 100% by FEMA. The management cost does not increase the local cost share amount. In addition, BRIC requires the sub-applicant to provide a match consisting of in-kind services by county staff and/or County funds at 25% (\$37,500) of the total cost of the project.

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

County staff recommends that the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners commit funds in the amount of \$37,500.00 (25% of the project cost), through in-kind services, county funds, or a combination, to the FY 22 BRIC grant by signing the attached letter to the State Hazard Mitigation Office. The funding will be used upon notification that the grant has been received.

Description

On June 10th, the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners was asked to Establish a Joint Fort Bragg & Cumberland County Food Policy Council during the June 10th Agenda Session and it was done so on June 21, 2021.

Over the last year the Joint Fort Bragg & Cumberland County Food Policy Council has worked to create an equitable food system for the community by addressing WIC/EBT enrollment and resources, transportation access, and communication/advertisement of the council and related food system resources.
