Chairman Lancaster called the meeting to order.

INVOCATION / PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Commissioner Boose provided the invocation followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American flag led by Lane White who was accompanied by his sister Libby White.

Commissioner Adams recognized in attendance Register of Deeds Lee Warren, Clerk of Superior Court Lisa Scales, ABC Board Vice Chair Frances Jackson, Lt. Daryl Scales, Town of Godwin Mayor Willie Burnette, Fayetteville City Councilmember Kathy Jensen, District Court Judge Ed Pone, Chief District Court Judge Robert Stiehl, Fort Bragg Garrison Commander Col. Kyle Reed and Fayetteville-Cumberland Economic Development Corporation CEO/President Robert Van Geons.

Recognition of Cumberland County Cares Award to Doug Austin, Alcohol Beverage Control Officer

Commissioner Council called on Doug Austin and stated the Board of Commissioners will present the Cumberland County Cares Award, the highest award the County can give to a citizen, to an individual who acted quickly during an emergency to assist in providing life-saving measures for a child. Commissioner Council stated Mr. Austin is an Alcohol Beverage Control Officer and on December 19th, Officer Austin saw an ambulance that was on an emergency run suddenly stop in the middle of the road. Commissioner Council stated Officer Austin went to the ambulance to check on the safety of the crew and, according to Paramedic Tom Price with Cumberland County EMS, Officer Austin recognized that the rescue crew was working the sudden cardiac arrest of a pediatric patient. Commissioner Council stated Officer Austin immediately offered aid and assumed airway management and correctly ventilated the patient in accordance with Basic Life Support protocols, which allowed both medics to accomplish other critical tasks. Commissioner Council stated even after additional help arrived, Officer Austin continued support, offering to ride with EMS to Cape Fear Valley Hospital where

he remained with the crew through the transfer of care to the Emergency Department.

Commissioner Council stated in the words of Paramedic Price, "Officer Doug Austin's actions were above and beyond the call of duty and exemplify the highest standards of public service. His demeanor on the scene was impeccable, calm and professional, which unquestionably led to superior care for the patient. His actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of Law Enforcement and Public Service and greatly reflect on the North Carolina Alcohol Law Enforcement Agency." Commissioner Council presented the Cumberland County Cares Award to Officer Austin. Commissioner Council recognized in attendance ABC Director David Horne.

Officer Austin thanked the Board of Commissioners for the recognition and esteemed honor. He also thanked his supervisors and superiors and stated he appreciated the opportunity to pursue training to keep his skills sharp.

WHEREAS, Chief of Field Artillery General William J. Snow decided in 1918 to establish a military camp outside Fayetteville, North Carolina, after finding the area had suitable terrain, adequate water, rail facilities and a climate for year-round military training; and

WHEREAS, Camp Bragg came into existence on September 4, 1918, and was named for General Braxton Bragg, a native North Carolinian, for his actions during the Mexican-American war; and

WHEREAS, Camp Bragg became Fort Bragg, a permanent Army post on September 30, 1922; and

WHEREAS, Fort Bragg has trained and deployed service members for all major wars and conflicts in its 100-year history to include World Wars I and II; Cold War operations in Dominican Republic, Vietnam, Grenada, and the Caribbean; Vietnam; Desert Storm; and Operations Enduring Freedom, Iraqi Freedom and New Dawn; and

WHEREAS, today Fort Bragg, the "Home of the Airborne and Special Operations Forces," with approximately 57,000 military personnel, 11,000 civilian employees and 23,000 family members, is one of the largest military complexes in the world and serves as headquarters for the U.S. Forces Command and U.S. Army Reserve Command; and

WHEREAS, Fort Bragg equips, trains, rapidly deploys, and sustains full spectrum forces supporting combatant commanders from a community of excellence where Soldiers, families and civilians thrive; and

WHEREAS, Cumberland County is proud to be the home of Fort Bragg and grateful to the military members and their families who have served our country and have helped make our community what it is today.

Commissioner Keefe and Commissioner Evans joined Garrison Commander Col. Kyle Reed at the podium. Commissioner Keefe stated he and Commissioner Evans had the privilege to serve and be neighbors of Fort Bragg for many years. Commissioner Keefe spoke to the bond between the community and Fort Bragg and stated one of the things that makes Cumberland County so unique is that it has become the world's hometown. Commissioner Keefe read the proclamation and presented the proclamation to Garrison Commander Col. Kyle Reed. Garrison Commander Col. Kyle Reed offered comments and stated the Fort Bragg installation is not an island but is linked to the community with more than 65% of its population living outside the gate. Garrison Commander Co. Kyle Reed stated he appreciated the recognition and the opportunity to tell not only who Fort Bragg is but what Fort Bragg provides in defense of this nation and in support of the freedoms we all enjoy. A "Shout Out to Fort Bragg" video followed.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Amy Cannon, County Manager, read the public comment policy. Chairman Lancaster recognized the clerk to the board who called the following speakers:

Chief District Court Judge Robert Stiehl – Judge Stiehl stated on June 4, Cumberland became one of the first counties to accept E-filing procedures for victims of domestic violence who are seeking to file civil protective orders. Judge Stiehl stated Cumberland has the support of Fort Bragg and the Pentagon and is the first to offer this to service members and dependents. Judge Stiehl provided monthly courthouse figures and expressed appreciation for the partnership with county government and military neighbors at Fort Bragg.

Andrew Early – Mr. Early appeared in support of the T.J. Robinson Life Center and spoke to the June 18 meeting and the Board's decision regarding the Mt. Vernon Estates project. Mr. Early stated he has been an advocate of the center since 2011, progress has been made since that time but there is still a way to go. Mr. Early stated the Center will affect far more individuals than those who reside in Mt. Vernon Estates and the same amount of funds should be given to the Center.

Pastor Proctor – Pastor Proctor appeared as the senior advisor to the advisory board of the T.J. Robinson Life Center and spoke to the monetary decision by the Board of Commissioners as it relates to Mt. Vernon Estates and the betterment of the county. Pastor Proctor stated \$2 million has been invested in the Center which is about four months from being open. Pastor Proctor asked for county support with the outlying debt of \$500,000.

2. PRESENTATIONS

A. Presentation of Request from Fayetteville-Cumberland Parks and Recreation Advisory Board to Rename the Grays Creek Recreation facilities and Approval of the Recommendation from the Facilities Committee

BACKGROUND

The Fayetteville-Cumberland Parks and Recreation Advisory has successfully submitted paperwork and supporting documentation, as required by the Cumberland County Facility Naming Policy, to rename the facilities at Gray's Creek Recreation Park in honor of Mr. John Dove ("J.D.") Pone. Please find attached the aforementioned documents with this memo along with the policy requirements and a checklist of the requirements that were met.

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

The Facilities Committee approved this item at its August 2, 2018 meeting to move forward to the full Board of Commissioners as a Presentation at the August 6, 2018 regular meeting.

Commissioner Council stated on August 2, the Facilities Committee approved a request from the Fayetteville-Cumberland Parks and Recreation Advisory Board to rename the Gray's Creek Recreation Center in memory of Mr. John Dove (J.D.) Pone. Commissioner Council stated she could think of no one more deserving of this honor than Mr. J.D. Pone who was passionate about volunteerism and offered his time and talents to numerous community boards and organizations.

Commissioner Council stated his community service included serving as the Deputy Chief at the Gray's Creek Fire Department Station 24 and the chaplain for the Cumberland County Fire Chief's Association. Commissioner Council stated he was a product of Cumberland County and graduated with honors from Anne Chesnutt High School in 1965. Commissioner Council stated he attended Fayetteville State University for nearly 4 years before being drafted to serve in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War, and after an honorable discharge and working up to the management ranks with Sears & Roebuck, he returned home to Cumberland County and worked for the Register of Deeds and Wilson-Gilmore Services.

Commissioner Council stated he was a champion for youth who served with organizations that promote youth development, including the Fayetteville Cumberland Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, where he served as chairman and the Gray's Creek Youth Association, one of the founders and a member of the Board of Directors of the Communities United for Youth Development and Southview High School Band Boosters. Commissioner Council stated he loved Willis Creek A.M.E. Zion Church, where he was a musician and sang in the Male Chorus, Gospel Choir and Senior Choir. He also served as the chairman of the Steward Board.

Commissioner Council asked members of Willis Creek A.M.E. Zion Church to stand and recognized Skip Carr of the Fayetteville Cumberland Parks and Recreation Advisory Board who spoke to the services J.D. Pone provided to the community, especially those for the youth.

Commissioner Council recognized members of the Pone family in attendance including his wife Mary D. Pone; his children, J.R. Pone and Dachia Davis; grandchildren and his brothers and sisters. Commissioner Council stated it is fitting that this recreation facility will bear the name of a man who devoted so much time and energy to the Gray's Creek community and the entire citizenry of Cumberland County.

Commissioner Council stated she is pleased and honored to offer the following motion.

Each fiscal year County departments may have projects that are not complete by the fiscal year end (6/30/18) or items ordered that have not been received by fiscal year end. These projects or

items were approved in the Fiscal Year 2018 budget; however, the money was not spent by June 30, 2018.

The following amendments seek to bring those funds forward from FY 2018 into the current fiscal year, allowing departments to complete and pay for these items. These revisions are not using 'new' funds but are recognizing the use of FY18 funds in FY19.

2) Health Department - Budget Ordinance Amendment B190035 to re-appropriate grant funds in the amount of \$6,777 for Environmental Health

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment B190035 in the amount of \$6,777 to re- appropriate grant funds. The grant is for Cumberland County Environmental Health staff to provide mentorship to Richmond County and Randolph County Health Departments. Guidance will be provided to both agencies on the self-assessment of their current process and identifying areas of improvement. These funds were approved at the February 5, 2018 Board of Commissioners meeting.

3) Health Department- Budget Ordinance Amendment B190045 to re-appropriate grant funds in the amount of \$1,908 for Environmental Health

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment B190045 in the amount of \$1,908 representing grant funds. This grant is to be used to purchase program supplies and was approved at the February 5, 2018 Board of Commissioners meeting.

4) Information Services - Budget Ordinance Amendment B190016 to re-appropriate funds in the amount of \$38,072 for computer equipment and the tax software consultant project

BACKGROUND

In late June, the NC Department of Commerce awarded Cumberland County an "Industrial Development Fund Grant" (IDF) of \$375,000, to support extending natural gas service to the Cedar Creek Park, and the Campbells / DHL Site project. In order to secure these funds, Cumberland County is required to pass a resolution of support, submit the attached Letter of Binding Commitment (LBC) and a full grant application (attached). No additional funding match is required for this project.

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

Chairman Lancaster closed the public hearing for Case P18-26.

MOTION: Commissioner Faircloth moved in Case P18-26 to approve the rezoning from RR Rural Residential to M(P) Planned Industrial/CZ Conditional Zoning for machine tool manufacturing and welding with existing manufactured home & accessory structures and find: a) The approval is an amendment to the adopted current Northeast Cumberland Land Use Plan (2010) map; and that the Board of Commissioners should not require any additional request or application for amendment to said map for this request because the land uses within any detailed plan area are not parcel specific and in any event the Land Use planning process was never intended to shut down an existing business; b) The following change in conditions was considered in amending the zoning ordinance (zoning map) to meet the development needs of the community: at the time the subject property was rezoned to RR Rural Residential, urban services and municipal influence areas did not exist, however the subject property is included on a list of potential properties for annexation by the Town of Godwin. c) And this rezoning approval is reasonable and in the public interest because although staff acknowledges the existing business has been expanded, the property owner has indicated this business began on the site prior to zoning, permit records do not go that far back, regardless it would be unfathomable to constrain an existing viable business when the owner voluntarily submitted this application once he became aware that the expansions were not accomplished in the proper manner. This rezoning is subject to the ordinance related conditions.

Other Public Hearings

F. Cumberland Road Business Street Plan

BACKGROUND

At the December 18, 2017 County Commissioners Meeting the Commissioners indicated they would like to see the portion of Cumberland Road from Owen Drive to Hope Mills Road reviewed for zoning consistency. It was determined that a study should be performed by Planning Department Staff. The Planning staff has completed the study and is requesting the Planning Board review and recommend approval including any recommended changes and forward to the Board of Commissioners for adoption. A public hearing on the plan was advertised for the August 20, 2018 Board of Commissioners meeting in the Fayetteville Observer.

Ms. Cannon reviewed the background information recorded above. Trey Smith, Comprehensive Planning Manager, stated Planning Department staff were directed by the County Commissioners to complete a study for the future land use of the area of Cumberland Road from Hope Mills Road to Owen Drive and in order to create a complete assessment of the study area, Planning staff researched and compiled data describing characteristics of the area including curb cuts, current land use and zoning, and proximity and availability of utilities. Mr. Smith stated Planning staff then used this data to create recommendations for future land use within the study area to be adopted as a Business Street Plan to supplement the existing Southwest Cumberland Land Use Plan, adopted in 2013.

Mr. Smith provided a presentation and reviewed maps depicting zoning, current uses, potential setback conformity, adjacent landowners, curb cuts and interior road access, rezoning cases within the last 10 years, vacant lots, PWC sewer approximations and potential land use violations. Mr. Smith stated the following recommendations for the study area were crafted by planning staff using data depicted in the maps:

- 1. Strongly encourage redevelopment with the use of conditional rezonings
- 2. Prohibit applicants from rezoning to heavy commercial where sewer is unavailable
- 3. Work with Environmental Health in determining septic and land use compatibility through conditional rezonings
- 4. Require mandatory sewer connection for rezoning requests located from Hope Mills Road east to Zareeba Drive and from the railroad east to Owen Drive per Section 2306 (A) of the Cumberland County Subdivision Ordinance
- 5. Encourage recombination of adjoining parcels under same ownership as condition of rezoning request approval
- 6. Work with NCDOT to limit curb cuts, recommend joint drives and use of lateral access
- 7. Continue to not process requests where active land use violations exist (per Board policy)
- 8. Target area for minimum housing and zoning violations

Mr. Smith stated in conclusion, the Cumberland Road study area is currently an equal mix of commercial, office and residential uses. County Planning staff have determined that future development in the area should be more commercial than residential in nature; however, the availability and cost of sewer to the area is a significant factor in how this area will develop going forward. Mr. Smith stated this is reflected in the recommendations of this plan by encouraging conditional rezonings in order to ensure that available utilities can support future development. Mr. Smith stated the recommendations also acknowledge that the overall appearance of the area needs improvement and can be addressed, at least partially, by stricter enforcement of existing ordinances.

Mr. Smith responded to questions posed by Commissioner Keefe about sewer and stated currently it would be more costly to extend sewer to the eastern half of the study area due to lack of existing sewer lines and topography; however, extending sewer to the western half would be less costly

due to the closer proximity of existing sewer lines and the topography being more favorable. John Allen of the Public Works Commission stated PWC has no plan in its capital budget to extend sewer to this area.

Commissioner Adams referenced the recommendations and stated the word "target" should be substituted by the word "review" in recommendation 8.

Chairman Lancaster opened the public hearing.

The clerk to the board advised there were no speakers.

Chairman Lancaster closed the public hearing.

 MOTION: Commissioner Council moved to approve the Cumberland Road Business Street Plan with the word "target" being substituted by the word "review" in recommendation 8.

G. Public Hearing for Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Grant (JAG)

BACKGROUND

The Sheriff's Office is fortunate to again be eligible to apply for funding from the Edward Bryne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) through the United States Department of Justice (USDOJ). This grant continues the UPDOJ efforts to support law enforcement at the local level.

The Cumberland County Sheriff's Office and the City of Fayetteville Police Department must submit a joint application, but each agency may use the funds for their own priorities. The grant allocation is \$146,619, with \$29,587 for the Sheriff's Office and \$117,032 for the Fayetteville Police Department.

The USDOJ requires the public be offered an opportunity to comment. The Sheriff's Office publicly advertised the grant opportunity in the Fayetteville Observer, Saturday Extra edition, on Saturday, August 4, 2018. We also request to brief the Board of Commissioners and request the required public hearing occur as part of the Monday, August 20, 2018 County Commissioners meeting.

Conduct the Public Hearing, approve the Memorandum of Understanding, complete the Certification and Assurances by the Chief Executive of the Applicant Government form, and authorize the County Manager to sign the application submittal.
