Chairman Evans called the meeting to order.

Commissioner Keefe provided the invocation followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American flag.

Recognition of Fayetteville Technical Community College for Operating the Fayetteville Cumberland Educational Channel for 15 Years

Chairman Evans asked FTCC President Dr. Larry Keen to come to the podium and stated Cumberland County and the Board of Commissioners wish to express their appreciation to Dr. Keen and the FTCC Media Services Department for their contributions to the community by operating the Fayetteville Cumberland Educational Television Channel for almost 15 years. Chairman Evans stated the process of developing and standing up a local public educational channel started as early as 1995 with planning meetings between FTCC, Cumberland County, the City of Fayetteville, Cumberland County Schools, Fort Bragg, and Fayetteville State University. Chairman Evans stated by late 2006, a programming coordinator was hired and the studio in the Harry F. Shaw Virtual College Center on the FTCC campus was equipped and ready to broadcast.

Chairman Evans stated FCETV provided quality educational and community programming, including the Board of County Commissioners meetings and other county government content, until the channel transitioned to Cumberland County N.C. TV on February 12. Chairman Evans stated FTCC continues to create programming for viewing on multiple digital platforms and will be contributing local programming to CCNC-TV. Chairman Evans presented a framed certificate to Dr. Keen and asked everyone to join him in thanking Dr. Keen and FTCC for operating the Fayetteville Cumberland Educational Television Channel for 15 years in service to the community's citizens. Dr. Keen provided brief comments and expressed his appreciation for the recognition.

Ms. Gaines reviewed the slide below indicating youth served through the JCPC program in Cumberland County for PY 2019-2020, state totals, and the estimated number of youths in Cumberland County between the ages 6 to 15.

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Ms. Gaines stated JCPC programs are doing an excellent job when considering some of the challenges associated with COVID-19 and with schools being shut down, the JCPC has adjusted

some of its programs to be conducted virtually. Ms. Gaines shared a success story of a youth involved in the gang prevention program.

Ms. Gaines reviewed the following slide about the Raise the Age impact in Cumberland County (District 12) when in 2017 16- and 17-year-old individuals who commit crimes in North Carolina were no longer automatically charged in the adult criminal justice system. Ms. Gains stated due to COVID-19, the state was unable to accurately assess how well RTA is currently doing but that information will be provided as soon as it becomes available.



"Thousands of North Carolina teens avoided jail time and a criminal record in 2020 under the state's new Raise the Age law. In its first year ending Dec. 1, the law kept 4,300 16-and 17year-olds in the juvenile justice system who might otherwise have been prosecuted as . adults. Before, those teens would have gone straight into the adult system, possibly shouldering them with a criminal record that could hinder future job, housing and financial-aid -William Lassiter, NCDPS Deputy Secretary of Juvenile

Ms. Gaines stated Cumberland County has received recognition for the work it is doing. Cumberland County Juvenile Court Services and Community Programs were acknowledged by Crystal Bennett, JCPC Central Area Consultant with NCDPS Division of Juvenile Justice/Community Programs for their innovative and collaborative efforts to provide continued direct service while keeping youth, employees and volunteers safe and for "reaching in" virtually to achieve sustainable impact with youth and their families during the uncertainties and risks over the last nine months.

Ms. Gaines concluded her presentation and responded to questions that followed. Commissioner Adams recognized Caroline Melvin, Supervisor at Pre-Trial Release, and thanked the county and Board of Commissioners for its contribution to this program and the JCPC.

PROCLAMATION SEVERE WEATHER AWARENESS WEEK MARCH 7-13, 2021

WHEREAS, the National Weather Service and the North Carolina Department of Public Safety are teaming up to bring a severe weather safety campaign to all of North Carolina's residents; and

WHEREAS, this year's North Carolina Severe Weather Preparedness Week will focus on tornadoes, large hail, lightning, flash flooding and damaging straight-line wind as well as implementing safety plans; and

WHEREAS, Wednesday, March 10 is the designated day for tornado drills to be held statewide in schools, government buildings and private companies; and

WHEREAS, Cumberland County residents should take a few moments to learn about severe weather safety and implement an emergency safety plan for home, school and work so we will all be better off when severe thunderstorms and tornadoes inevitably strike our state and minimize the likelihood of injury and fatalities caused by severe weather; and

WHEREAS, Cumberland County residents should listen to local radio, television, a weather channel or a NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) weather radio for information on severe weather and sign up for emergency alert systems such as Cumberland Alerts weather warnings; and

WHEREAS, the time to put an emergency kit together is before severe weather strikes so Cumberland County residents should have a disaster supply kit on hand that contains a first-aid kit, a battery-powered radio, flashlight with extra batteries, canned and other non- perishable foods, a hand operated can opener, bottled water, sturdy shoes and work gloves.

NOW THEREFORE, We, the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners, hereby proclaim March 7-13, 2021 as "SEVERE WEATHER PREPAREDNESS WEEK" in Cumberland County and call upon our residents to become weather ready and pledge to prepare for severe weather.

4. PUBLIC HEARINGS

A. Public Hearing on Proposed Economic Development Incentives for "Project Wolfpack"

BACKGROUND

This public hearing is to consider an economic development incentive package for "Project Wolfpack". This project is an opportunity to support the expansion of an existing employer, with facilities in multiple states. With the intent of retaining quality jobs, paying substantially above our County average wage, and expansion of our non-residential tax base, FCEDC is respectfully requesting the Commissioners consider approving an incentive grant for Cargill/Project Wolfpack CG.

Cargill is a longstanding employer in Fayetteville and Cumberland County, directly connected to our region's agricultural industry (Food Products including soybean and peanut oils). In addition to providing stable employment and above average wages, the company consistently contributes to area non-profits, disaster recovery, and relief initiatives. Currently, the company is evaluating competing locations for an expansion of production capacity.

Subject to final acceptance by the Company, and execution of the required Incentive Agreement, the Company proposes to:

- · Maintain a minimum of 70 jobs at their Cumberland County facility through 2028
- · Pay an average wage of at least \$70,000 per year
- · Invest more than \$5 million in real estate improvements
- · Add approximately \$20 million in new personal property

With the project substantially complete by the end of 2022, as proposed, Cumberland County would provide:

- · A 6-year incentive grant, offset by the tax revenue generated by the increased assessed value of real and personal property
- · In the first year of the agreement, a grant of \$90,000 is proposed
- · In years 2-6 a grant of \$101,000 is proposed
- · In no year shall the grant exceed 50% of the net increased tax revenue received by the County

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

Hold the public hearing for "Project Wolfpack". After the public hearing, consider approval of the local incentive grant that in no year shall the grant exceed 50% of the net increased tax revenue received by the County.

Robert Van Geons, Fayetteville Cumberland Economic Development Commission President/CEO presented the background information recorded above for "Project Wolfpack".

BACKGROUND

This public hearing is to consider an economic development incentive package for "Project NUAR". "Project NUAR" is a U.S. headquartered company that is considering an existing building located at 595 S. King Street, Fayetteville, for a new production facility. If we are successful in attracting this company, this company proposes to:

- · Create 75 new jobs, to be located at a facility in Cumberland County (Fayetteville), by 2025
- Pay an average wage exceeding \$45,000 per year
- · Invest more than \$4 million in real estate improvements and equipment As proposed, Cumberland County would provide the following:
- · A grant of \$1,500 per job, for the first 15 jobs created
- · A grant of \$625 per job, for the next 60 jobs created
- This grant shall be paid annually on an agreed upon date, based on the number of new jobs created during the previous year.
- To receive payment, the Company will have to retain the previous year's head count and demonstrate that they have exceeded the average wage for all positions.
- One hiring is complete, the Company shall be required to maintain the jobs for an additional 24 months. Should the company fail to maintain employment, they shall be required to repay the grant amount corresponding to the shortfall.

The City of Fayetteville will be holding a public hearing to consider a similar request. The Company anticipates a final decision within the next 45 - 60 days.

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

Hold the required public hearing for "Project Nuar". After the public hearing, consider approval of the local incentive grant in an amount not to exceed \$60,000.
