Recognition of Cumberland County Animal Services Veterinarian, Dr. April Kelly

Chairman Adams stated Dr. April Kelly, the Cumberland County Animal Services veterinarian, is leaving because her husband, who is an Army veterinarian, is being transferred to another duty station. Chairman Adams stated Dr. Kelly has been a dedicated professional who has been devoted to the animals at Animal Services and her excellence and competence will be missed. Chairman Adams stated Dr. Kelly built a shelter medicine and spay/neuter program from scratch and worked with Animal Services Director Elaine Smith to implement upgrades that improved the level and quality of service at Cumberland County Animal Services. Chairman Adams stated Cumberland County is thankful for Dr. Kelly's time and service and extends best wishes for her continued and deserved success.

2. PRESENTATIONS

A. Update on the Foster Care Family Recruitment Campaign by the Cumberland County Department of Social Services and the Public Information Office

Ms. Cannon introduced Delores Long, Assistant Social Services Director. Ms. Long stated out of the 733 children who are in foster care, 275 have been placed out of county and 42 have been placed out of state and there is truly a need for foster families in Cumberland County. Ms. Long stated having a large military installation in the county is one of the possible reasons for the high number of foster children because a lot of the families who come to the county do not have direct or natural supports in the community. Ms. Long stated the Department of Social Services is collaborating with the county's Public Information Office in a Foster Care Family Recruitment Campaign, "Not Perfect...Just Willing", to increase foster families within Cumberland County.

B. Cumberland County Public Library's 13th Annual Storytelling Festival

BACKGROUND

The library received a \$5,000 grant from the Arts Council of Fayetteville/Cumberland County to support the month-long festival. This year's theme is "The Sun, the Moon and the Stars."

Faith Phillips, Cumberland County Public Library Director, stated the Cumberland County Public Library will kick off the 13th Annual Storytelling Festival at Segra Stadium on Friday, March 11, 2022, at 6:30 p.m. and everyone is welcome to this family friendly event. Ms. Phillips stated Dr. Brian Sturm, a feature storyteller, will share stories about the wonderous sky; stories, games and fun will be on-hand for all participants at the March 11 event.

Ms. Phillips stated the free storytelling festival will take place March 1-31 throughout the Cumberland County Library System with virtual and in-person stories and activities for children from birth to age 12. The Cumberland County Public Library received a \$5,000 grant from the Arts Council of Fayetteville/Cumberland County in August 2021 for the Storytelling Festival.

Ms. Phillips stated the theme for this year's festival is "The Sun, the Moon, and the Stars" and programs and activities will focus on the solar system and the stars while exposing participants to stories and myths about the heavens from a variety of cultures.

C. Approval of Sole Source Purchase of a New Software for Community Development

BACKGROUND

Funds in the amount of \$38,500.00 have been appropriated in the Community Development Department's fiscal year 2022 budget to purchase a new software to replace the current Loan's software. Cumberland County's Innovation and Technology Services staff worked with Community Development staff in recommending the best option. The recommended software will expand on what the current software offers by allowing Community Development to manage loans, applications, calculate loan payments, manage bid and contract information as well as provide inspection functionality for construction contracts, managed by Community Development staff.

This software is an advanced platform that no other hosted software is available to provide that can address in one solution the automation of the enrollment, qualification, administration and reporting for all of Cumberland County's Community Development programs.

Benevate Inc. is the producer and sole source vendor of Neighborly Software's Housing, Economic and Community Development hosted software. Benevate, Inc. further certifies that no other hosted software is available for purchase that can address all of Cumberland County's Community Development Department needs in one solution.

RECOMMENDATION / PROPOSED ACTION

Finance and Purchasing staff recommend utilizing the sole source bid exception based on North Carolina General Statute 143-129 (e) (6) (ii), as product is available from only one source.

D. Approval of Budget Ordinance Amendments for the March 7, 2021 Board of Commissioners' Agenda

BACKGROUND

General Fund 101

1) Emergency Services - Budget Ordinance Amendment B221055 to recognize North Carolina Department of Public Safety Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) funds in the amount of \$4,718

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment B221055 to recognize North Carolina Department of Public Safety Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) funds in the amount of \$4,718. In the FY22 budget, \$78,000 was budgeted for this grant, but the total award amount will be \$82,718, an increase of \$4,718. These funds will be used to assist with the purchase of items and courses for the Emergency Management section.

Please note this amendment requires no additional county funds.

2) Public Safety Other – Budget Ordinance Amendment B220889 to appropriate fund balance in the amount of \$248,000 for youth detention subsidies

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment B220889 to appropriate fund balance in the amount of \$248,000 for youth detention subsidies. The North Carolina Youth Detention Subsidy is based on the length of time a Judge remands a juvenile at their discretion. This amount includes projected expenses over the budgeted amount for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2022.

Please note this amendment requires appropriation of general fund balance.

3) Health Department - Budget Ordinance Amendment B221010 to budget Medicaid funds in the amount of \$278,345.

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment B221010 in the amount of \$278,345 to budget Medicaid (Prepaid Health Plan) funds. As part of the transition to Managed Care on July 1, 2021, the cost settlement process has changed to a quarterly settlement for services rendered under a Prepaid Health Plan. Local Health Departments will receive 100% of the cost settlement funds from the Prepaid Health Plans but will be required to submit an Intergovernmental Transfer for the non-federal share of the settlement payment to North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Health Services.

Please note this amendment requires no additional county funds.

4) Department of Social Services – Budget Ordinance Amendment B220753 to recognize Pandemic Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) funds in the amount of \$2,961,784 from the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment B220753 to recognize Pandemic Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) funds from the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services in the amount of \$2,961,784. These funds will be used for a pandemic automatically authorized payment for households with children aged 0-10 that are receiving food and nutrition services (FNS) and received LIEAP Fiscal Year 2020-2021.

Please note this amendment requires no additional county funds.

Capital Investment Fund 107

5) Capital Investment Fund – Vehicles - Budget Ordinance Amendment B220683 to recognize insurance reimbursement funds in the amount of \$4,140

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment B220683 to recognize insurance settlement funds in the amount of \$4,140. These funds represent a total loss vehicle incident which occurred on January 10, 2022.

Please note this amendment requires no additional county funds.

Stream Restoration Grant Fund 243

6) Stream Restoration Grant – Budget Ordinance Amendment B220002 to recognize the fiscal year 2022 allocation of the North Carolina Legislated State Directed Grants in the amount of \$2,000,000 for Methodist University Stream Restoration

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment B220002 to recognize the fiscal year 2022 allocation of the North Carolina Legislated State Directed Grants in the amount of \$2,000,000 for Methodist University Stream Restoration. These funds will be utilized to reimburse

Methodist University for stream restoration expenditures incurred between the timeframe of July 1, 2021, and June 30, 2023.

Each fiscal year County departments may have projects that have been approved and initiated but were not complete by the fiscal year end (6/30/21) or items ordered that had not been received by fiscal year end. 8) Disaster Recovery Act 2017 – Budget Ordinance Amendment B221058 to re-appropriate FY21 North Carolina Disaster Relief Act 2017 and North Carolina State Acquisition and Relocation Fund (SARF) funds in the amount of \$890,300
